

PRESIDENT'S COLUMN

As many of you are aware, Carolyn Boardman has held the appointment of Membership Chairperson for several years. Carolyn has decided that it is time to hand over these duties to someone else, and has resigned from the position. On behalf of OALT/ABO, I wish to express sincere thanks to Carolyn for all her efforts over the years. We shall miss her diligent attention to detail, a quality that this position requires. It was agreed, at the November Executive/ Board of Directors' meeting, that, as an interim measure, the duties will be shared by the Treasurer (C. Davy), Public Relations Coordinator (M. Hunt), and Label Contractor (B. Gore). The procedures followed by the regions are still in effect.

At the September Executive/ Board meeting, a decision was made to postpone the publication of the 1991 membership directory. The primary reason for this is financial constraint. At the November meeting, we considered ways in which the production and distribution costs could be offset. We agreed to approach a select list of potential corporate sponsors who might be interested in advertising in the directory.

Obtaining external funding is one way of getting the project underway, but the membership can help by letting us know how useful the directory is. How many of you actually use, or need, your directory? Personally, I find it a very useful tool. However, not all members may feel the same. Each director will be posing this question at the next available regional meeting-please let your representative know whether you consider this publication worthwhile or not. Once we have a realistic idea of how many copies are required, we can proceed with production.

Associations face the same financial situations as individuals and OALT/ABO is no different from most others. Though we have been managing well, within the budget we have set for ourselves, we have to admit that costs are increasing and we may have to increase our membership fees in order to meet future needs. Please talk to your Directors about this, so that they will be prepared to discuss a proposed increase at the February Board meeting. Recently, Gary Wilson, a former library technician at Queen's University Library, made the news when he was

elected MPP for Kingston. Although OAL'T/ABO members are well aware of the usefulness of the skills attributed to our profession, it's interesting to see someone find yet another alternative occupation.

Happy 15th anniversary to the Halton/Peel Region of OALT/ABO. I was pleased to attend their party, on November 23, in Brampton. When I first joined the Association, I was a member of this region, and as a Sheridan College alumnus, I have kept in touch with many fellow grads and Halton/Peel members. Celebrations of this nature help us to appreciate the efforts of earlier members and to inspire newcomers to continue the valuable work of our Association.

On a final note, I would like to leave you with this thought. Job security and further education complement one another. An employer can recognize the efforts an employee makes to keep skills up to date and maintain professional awareness. It may be the deciding factor in obtaining that new job or promotion, or simply keeping the position you have.
