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I would like to thank everyone who participated in the OALT/ABO mission statement writing and strategic planning session on March 27th.

Jenny Amy was an outstanding facilitator. Her expertise on OALT/ABO and the library and information industry was instrumental in allowing us to achieve our objective of completing a mission statement in half a day.

Our first task was to define what OALT/ ABO means to us from both a leadership and member perspective. General ideas that were mentioned: to promote the interests of its members; a resource and support for those working in the library and information field; to provide learning opportunities through regional workshops and the annual conference; networking opportunities and to set standards of professionalism for Library and Information Technicians.

Our next assignment was to break out in smaller groups and brainstorm our vision of OALT/ABO in 2005. We brought back our ideas and communicated them within the larger group. What we found interesting about this exercise, was the many similarities in ideas from the different groups. The following is a brief summary of our ideas.

- utilizing the expertise of experienced/long time members as mentors
- broader/sustaining/increasing/ active membership
- paid staff person and office
- certification for various skills sets (ie Webmaster, LAN administrator etc.) With courses offered in partnership with community colleges or by distance education or as regional workshops
- research grants and increase in corporate sponsorships
- recognition of the association throughout North America for its unique character
- ad-hoc committees that will showcase members talents
- · executive turnover every two years
- new name and logo to reflect these changes

Working together within the larger group, we referred to the brainstorming ideas in conjunction with the objectives in our

Survey of Northwestern Ontario Region Secondary School Library Catalogue Systems

The purpose of this survey is to examine the variety and possible trends of library catalogue systems used in secondary school's in the Northwest Ontario Region.

METHOD

Survey forms were mailed to twenty-three of the approximately twenty-seven secondary schools in eleven of the thirty individual school boards in the NOR. Both the separate and the public school boards were surveyed. Schools were excluded from the survey because they did not fit the survey profile.

RESULTS

Completed survey forms were returned from ten of the eleven (91%) school boards surveyed. Eighty-three percent of the selected schools returned completed survey forms. Eight of the eleven school boards had a 100 % completion rate for all the schools within their board.

Types of Catalogues in use

Three libraries use card and on-line catalogues, eight use card catalogues and eight use on-line catalogues.

Area serviced by Catalogue

School libraries in three different school boards, report that the catalogue(s) in use, service all the schools within their board. Five school libraries report that the catalogue in use services their school's library only.

Use of on-line Catalogues

Five school libraries use on-line catalogues purchased from vendor's while six are using in-house cataloguing systems.

The average number of years an on-line catalogue has been in use is 5.1.

Record Import Method

Nine libraries import bibliographic records manually, one imports marc records and five import records using a marc or manual format.

Library Personnel

Twelve secondary school libraries employ Library Technicians, three employ Teacher-Librarians, one employs a Library Assistant, one employs a person who has no library training and one uses a Full-time Teacher-Librarian and a half-time Library Technician.

DISCUSSION

Due to the small sample size and approximately 26 percent of the survey results were submitted by secondary schools located within the Lakehead District School Board, a discussion of trends within Northwestern Ontario Secondary School Libraries is almost impossible.

RECOMMENDATIONS

A more comprehensive survey could be designed and sent to all the libraries within the NWO Region. Areas of particular interest may include;

- number of records in the library
- number of students serviced by the catalogue
- employee's tenure in the library
- adequacy of the catalogue system
- how many users does the catalogue accommodate at one time

A larger more comprehensive survey would provide more information upon which to base conclusions.

David Cassel was presented with the OALT/ABO Thunder Bay Branch award on 25 March 1999 as a graduating student who, in the opinion of the department has demonstrated exceptional academic performance and professional promise.
