

Public Relations and displaying at CLA

For the past 2 years, the Provincial Executive and Board of Directors' have made Public Relations one of their main goals in order to raise public awareness of our Association. Over the past several years, not only have membership numbers been dwindling but also attendance at our annual conferences, and our Association cannot survive if these trends continue to grow.

With the success of our display at OLA in February, our attention turned to CLA, which was being held in Toronto, June 16th to the 20th. This could not have happened without the help of many volunteers, and sponsorship from: Alberta Association of Library Technicians (AALT), Algonquin College LIT Program, CLA Library Technician Interest Group, Glaxo Wellcome, Lakehead University LT program, LOHANIA Region of OALT/ ABO, Manitoba Association of Library Technicians (MALT), and Seneca College LIT Program. To cut some of the cost of our display we shared a booth with the "Canadian Deaf Heritage Literature". Once again we held several draws which included a free membership, and a golf shirt. We invited all attendees of CLA to join with a \$10 discount on membership. The Lohania branch contributed money to purchase much needed display stands for the many information brochures sent by the Library and Information Technician programs at Algonquin, Mohawk, Seneca and Thunder Bay. We also displayed a general information package of the duties of a Library Technician and pamphlets from some of the other provincial Library and Information Technician associations.

OALT/ABO has purchased both a conference display, and a banner sign, to use at conferences and trade shows. These 2 purchases will last for years, and will help with our goal of promoting ourselves, enlisting new members and attracting attention.

I attended CLA to volunteer on the booth, and to attend the breakfast and session with CLA's Library Technicians Interest group, and was in awe of how huge the trade show was. It didn't seem to matter how many times I traveled down the rows of booths, I was always able to find something new and interesting. What was truly amazing were all the goodies everyone seemed to be handing out, pens, bookmarks, pads, coffee mugs. An added bonus was that the Canadian Booksellers' Association was hosting their trade show next to CLA, and attendees were able to enter. This allowed us to gather up more goodies, which included books, more pens, and posters. We were also wined and dined with baked goods, wine, and blue martinis. What can I say but...what a weekend!

I wish to thank all the volunteers who helped in this endeavor; from the beginning, with seeking donations, buying the display and other necessities, contacting CLA, and the Canadian Deaf Heritage Literature, to setting up the display, manning the booth and answering questions, we couldn't have done it without you.

Report on COLT

(Council On Library/Media Technicians) Conference

It had been decided at our 1998 ABM to send our provincial public relations coordinator to the COLT conference, however if that person was unable to attend, then a substitute would be sent. As it happened Gislaine Janveaux just started a new job and thus, could not attend. Nanci Abbondanza applied to the listsery for a substitute and I seizing the opportunity, volunteered. Since our OPEIU union was talking of a potential strike I figured I would utilize this unforeseen absence from work constructively. Nanci had asked me to check transportation costs and bring such information to the next administrative board meeting, where a decision as to my attendance of the COLT Conference would be voted upon. Through much research it was decided that the most economic route was by flying to Toronto, catching a train to Windsor, and finally a taxi to land me on the front steps of the hotel in Detroit. With this new twist on the classic planes, trains and automobiles, my travel costs would come to \$514.00. Living in Thunder Bay, you learn to plan far in advance and of course pray for seat sales. This time however, I had a mere ten days and this was the very best I could do. At the Board meeting on 27 March 1999, it was voted in that I would attend the COLT conference in Gislaine's place.

Since COLT encompasses the entire United States, most attendees had their way paid and appeared to be heavily involved in their association. Each day started with an en masse session followed by three workshop sessions-- attendees had a possible of six workshops to choose from. From the six choices people went to a workshop in either Room A or Room B. This meant only two meeting rooms were rented for the two days and the workshop presenters were ensured a good group size. Dr. Maurice Wheeler, Detroit's chief librarian was the keynote speaker. He spoke on the social, economical and technological facets of Detroit's libraries. He advised that 50% of what we know to date will be obsolete-- however we do not know which 50%! He noted as well, that his library board supports life-long learning by providing \$600.00 per employee for training classes. After Dr. Wheeler's inspirational talk, I attended the workshop presented by Dorothy Morgan. She provided an overview of the movement to certify library support staff. It was hard for me to grasp the enormity of such a task in an attempt to set a standard for an entire nation. I developed a greater, intrinsic appreciation for what our founding members of OALT/ABO have accomplished.



After lunch, I attended the workshop on creating a newsletter for your library. Speaker, Missy Anderson, using solely the template in Word (same as in WordPerfect), showed how to pull in graphics, change fonts, and generally add spice to a newsletter. I must admit, I did make a point of providing her with a copy of NEWSletter/NOUVelles. After the break, I attended the "Troubleshooting your PC" workshop by Robbie Weaver. Robbie explained that there were simple troubleshooting steps one can attempt before calling for help. Maintenance of course being a key component. In his computer lab, the covers are taken off and the CPU vacuumed every three months. Using the Curtis Clean Mouse kit, the mouse balls are cleaned monthly. Using texwipe, the keyboards are cleaned monthly. By doing this simple maintenance work, he maintained that it greatly reduces the number of problem calls. We definitely need someone like Robbie in Thunder Bay! I am trying to use his suggestions with my computer at home and at work. His session was very practical and applicable. The treat for the evening was a trip across the border to tour the Windsor Casino.

Day two proved just as interesting as the first. The day began with a general membership and business meeting. This was where I was able to thank them for paying my conference fees and I also used this time to provide them with information on OALT/ABO. I presented their president, Diane Welsh, with an anniversary golf shirt. Pam Casey and I were both wearing ours and proudly represented our association. I must add at this point, that Pam Casey attended the COLT conference last year as the OALT/ABO representative, but attended this year as a COLT member. She had certainly paved the road of acceptance for me. Margaret Barron (from Cleveland) who had attended OALT/ABO conferences, spoke highly of our association (and of Doug Wilford).

Next was a workshop presented by the publisher and editor of *Library Mosaics*. After the completion of the brainstorming ideas, that consequently will be turned into an article for the January 2000 issue, they handed out activity booklets that posed such questions as "Why do you find it difficult to write?" and "What are the things you feel you need to write?" This led to

the next activity of "Where and what type of work do you do?" This activity was then collected and photographs were taken so they could present these articles, complete with pictures, in future issues of Library Mosaics. This workshop was followed by Lisa Schultze who presented practical tools and techniques for publishing a newsletter on the web. In summation, I found the COLT workshops to be more hands-on and practical than what I am used to. I felt I could apply something from every session I attended to my everyday life and to the procedures of the OALT/ABO.

Their conference closed with a jam session where beefs and bouquets were discussed, followed by an awards banquet.

I thank everyone for my attendance at the COLT conference. For two days, I promoted the professionalism and direction of our association. If I can provide you with any further information on anything, please feel free to ask.

The generic content of some of the sections shows that this guide has been intended also for those who need an answer to questions about job seeking, the evolution and the requirements of the job market. Also, it brings an important number of original ideas and topics for thought, to all of people who want to make the field of documentation/information their main field of activity and anyone who is still on training, looking for a job or already working. L'amorce d'une carrière: comment trouver un emploi en gestion de l'information et de la documentation...et le conserver! It examines questions like job seeking, strategies of



action to put in place when planning and managing a career in documentation/information; best ways to obtain, keep and develop a career in documentation/information; the future of the profession in the public and private sectors and finally, consideration about becoming his/her own boss in the field. This French-language book proposes a specific approach, easy to put to work but, above all, realistic.


