Sheridan's Library and Information Technician Program - 30 Years of Excellence

It is a time of transitions and changes in all areas including the library field and the education system. After 30 years of existence Sheridan's Library and Information Technician program graduated its final group of students in May 2000.

The program began in 1970, also a time of transition. The first graduates worked hard to establish themselves in the new career path. Under the coordination of Geraldine Hughes, Sheridan's program gained a reputation for solid knowledge and skills in card typing, audio-visual productions, cataloguing, circulation, acquisitions and basic reference. By Hughes retirement in 1983, students were trying out their first tentative online searches using a terminal and floppy-eared modem.

In 1983, I took over the program and continued pushing technological and curriculum changes to reflect the leading edge changes in our field. Students soon began cataloguing online and learning the basics of word processing. Audio-visual slides gave way to Power Point presentations. In 1995, I led the Sheridan Web Pilot Project and successfully moved the web from pilot to produc-

tion. At the same time, students began to build web pages and explore issues in electronic publishing. Soon students were studying hardware and software maintenance and office systems for libraries. I received many calls from colleagues commenting on our grads' comfort level and knowledge in library systems. Graduate's jobs also reflected these changes – systems administrator, web designer, database technician, electronic services representative and knowledge manager.



Throughout the program, many associations and organizations sponsored awards --

the SLA, Toronto Chapter Award, the Sheridan Park Library and Information Science Award, the Records and Information Management (RIM) Technology Award, the OALT/ABO Library Technician's Merit Plaque and Eva Schnurr Awards, the Micromedia Reference and Indexing Awards and others.

To encourage active involvement in our associations, I released students from classes so they could volunteer at the OLA Annual Conference. Although initially fearful, they soon recognized the value of volunteering and the excitement of being an active part

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A reunion: Fanshawe College

In the fall of 1999, Fanshawe College announced it was suspending enrollment in the Library and Information program. Many were surprised and saddened, especially the graduates of the program. Marilyn Turner, the Fanshawe College Alumni Officer, suggested organizing a reunion. The Ontario Association of Library Technicians (OALT/ABO) Lohania branch worked with the Fanshawe College Alumni office to plan a reunion. Invitations were sent to graduates, students and faculty who had taught in the program.

The reunion was held in Fanshawe College's Saffron's dining room on Saturday, April 29, 2000 from 2 to 5 PM. About 100 attended to say farewell to the program and to honour the program co-ordinator, Marie Wiley. The early graduates of the program were delighted that Cliff Weaver, the first co-ordinator, was able to attend. It was a wonderful afternoon of reminiscing and reacquainting with former classmates and teachers. Everyone had one last visit to the lab where classes were held for many years. There they helped Marie clean out the room by taking home momentos such as books, class newsletters, pictures, etc.

Thank you to Fanshawe College for providing us with the education to pursue our careers. We hope, in the future, there will be a need for Fanshawe to once again provide a similar program.

Lakehead University's Library Technology Program 1966-2000

In 1966, the School of Library Technology, Faculty of Professional Studies at Lakehead University, developed the first program for the training of Library Technicians in Ontario, and the second program of its kind in Canada. Lakehead adopted the two-year program for its students. In 1988, The School of Library Technology became the Department of Library and Information Studies, Faculty of Arts and Science offering a three-year Bachelor of Arts Degree with a major in Library and Information Studies. In 1990, due to the government's decision not to fund the B.A. program, the Department discontinued the B.A. and offered a two-year Diploma in Library and Information Studies, with the option of continuing into the third year of a B.A. Degree program. Students with a B.A. Degree could take the fourteen LIS credits during a further year of study and receive the Diploma in Library and Information Studies. Whatever the program, graduates were qualified Library Technicians.

The Library and Information Studies Diploma program at Lakehead University in Thunder Bay was unique, in that it was housed in a university. LIS students were admitted on the same basis as any other student pursuing a university undergraduate degree program; many scholarships and awards being available. Since our students were taking degree credit liberal arts subjects, upon graduation from the Diploma program, they were allowed into the third year of a B.A.; students with a B.A. already having completed the liberal arts component of the Diploma, could complete the two year Diploma in one further year of study. LIS graduates were well versed in technical library skills as well as having obtained a well rounded liberal arts background which furthered their employability. Many of our students having completed their Bachelor of Arts Degree continued to the Master of Library Science Degree offered at University of Western Ontario, University of Toronto, Dalhousie University, University of Alberta, etc.

Although the objectives and basic structure of the Library & Information Studies Diploma at Lakehead University have changed

little, the course content has been continually revised in response to the changing needs of the library profession – public, school, academic, special, and emerging information marketplace. Despite financial pressures and space restrictions, the Department managed to maintain its learning laboratory collection of professional journals, books, multimedia products, and databases. This is due in large part to the publishers who are sending library schools free books and materials, demonstration disks, and "classroom" programs, which have allowed the introduction of new services at minimal or no cost to the Department.

"first Library Technician program in Ontario...Lakehead University"

The first Library Technician program in Ontario was developed at Lakehead University by Dan Sudar to fill the need for trained library staff on a para-professional level in Thunder Bay and Northwestern Ontario. Since 1966, one of the main objectives of the program was that the School/Department offer its program off campus. Maintaining program enrolment in the program over an extended period of time has been challenging. The need for fully qualified and trained library personnel in the region is as important today was it was in the sixties. During the 34 years of the program, students came from all over the world, and likewise Lakehead's graduates found employment worldwide.

The Department recognized the importance of life-long learning for a professional in today's ever-changing and technologically advanced world. Since 1998, the Department offered a variety of cost-recovery workshops for students in the program and library professionals in the field. These workshops included CDROM searching, AACR2, DDC20, MARC records, Dialog searching, Security Systems, Video Cataloguing, Computer-Assisted Research in Law, Careers for LIS Graduates, Reference, and Quick Law Database Searching, etc. Professionals from outside of Thunder Bay facilitated these one to two day workshops. Cost recovery workshops were discontinued in 1994.

In 1990, Senate approved 3.5 full course equivalent Library & Information Studies courses as Degree credit open to all university students as academic electives for their B.A. Degree programs. These courses are the ones that now make up the Minor in Information Studies being offered for the first time in September 2000.

In 1994, Lakehead University launched its world wide web site. The Department of Library & Information Studies was one of the first departments to have a link to the Lakehead University home page. In 1999, the first web-based LIS course was available for delivery. The Department now has two web-based courses available to students both on and off campus.

At its Senate Meeting of April 2000, the University decided to discontinue the Diploma program at Lakehead University and at (Continued on page 5)

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its meeting of June 2000, to begin a Minor in Information Studies effective September 2000. A minor concentration in Information Studies, consists of three full course equivalent courses from the Department of Library and Information Studies.

The main objectives of the Minor in Information Studies is to provide students with the ability to develop the strategies to locate, access, retrieve, evaluate, and use, information in all its forms. The key to a strong Information Studies program will be the successful integration of the program across the university curricula.

The Library & Information Studies Diploma program was unique, was one of high quality, was highly effective, and wellrecognized in the library field. The decision to discontinue the program was based on the belief that Lakehead University should discontinue all diploma programs within the University.

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National Library of Wales

A visit to Aberystwyth, in mid-Wales, resulted in the fulfillment of a lifetime dream. I was born in Wales and have always wanted to visit the National Library of Wales. That dream was fulfilled as I went on vacation to England and Wales.

Aberystwyth (pronounced Aber-ist-with) is situated in the county of Ceredigion (the Welsh) or if you want the English – Cardiganshire. It's a coastal town, subject to the high winds and storms associated with that position. The University of Wales main campus forms a part of the fabric of the town. I noticed a sign that pointed out to students that they should not wade in the waters during high winds, as the tides will sweep them away. In fact, students had lost their life due to an attempt to test the waters.

The library building is situated on the south side of the university campus. The afternoon weather cleared as we approached the National Library of Wales so that I was able to take a series of shots of the sea front before we entered the building. Upon entering the building, one is aware of the display cases that showcase various items of the library.

I was most impressed with a large collection of treasures that can be found at the library. This included many maps, prints, paintings, furnishings, globes and most importantly, the books. It was wonderful to view a first book actually printed, while it was illegal, during a time when religious books were not allowed. A monk printed this book in a cave. But I can't remember the date! I was also able to view a video that spoke about the daily activities of the library. A new addition has just been built which will allow another 20 years of storage. At that point, they'll have to build out in the parking lot, as I had asked. But CD-ROMS and microfiche should assist in the struggle to preserve space.

The Welsh are well known for their Welsh dragon and the Welsh language. In fact, the longest place name in the world belongs to a village in Wales. They have just established their very own website and I will not endeavour to spell that name for you. But I can say it!
