

FROM THE PRESIDENT

f would like to take this opportunity to voice a few of my concerns, bring you up-to-date on provincial matters, and, to ask for your comments on certain matters.

First, however, I would like to thank Pat Henry for her work as the first President of this branch. The amount of time which Pat contributed to matters affecting Huronia Region, and the larger library community, was only evident to me after going through the correspondence, minutes of meetings and related papers which were passed on to me. Your concern and interest is appreciated by all of us, Pat, and we know that your expertise will be available to us in the future.

At the Provincial level we have a lot going on, and a very able executive ready to make decisions. I was impressed by the quality of our first Director's meeting held at the North Toronto Branch of the Toronto Public Library on June 20, 1981. Items of interest from the minutes of that meeting are as follows:

-The balance in the Provincial treasury stands at \$2575.43 as of June 6, 1981.

-An alphabetical list of names of members, by region, will be added to the regular membership directory.

-Editors are needed for the Provincial Newsletter.

-OALT/ABO archival material will be sent to the Ontario Archives.

-Dorothy Kew reported on the CLA Conference. She was most impressed by the program arranged for Library Technicians. It was well attended, not only by technicians, but also by others in the library field. Dorothy also enjoyed meeting other technicians from across Canada.

-Paulette Thibault has agreed to be liaison person for "Proposal for Change". Feedback from the Regions is needed. PLEASE NOTE!

-The OALT/ABO Funding Committee is to become a Presidential Committee. -Nancy Mack is voting member for the Canadian Library Association, representing OALT/ABO.

-Other business discussed included - new membership card design, new brochure on Library Technicians, indexing of the newsletter, travelling expenses, geographical division of regions, and the slide project which Nancy Mack is coordinating.

I am quite concerned about the lack of attendance at our regular meetings. A map, showing the possible boundaries for Huronia Region, as suggested by the Povincial executive, is attached. This map indicates one of our major problems the large geographical area. Suggestions to help alleviate this problem have beethmade at recent meetings. Our last meeting was based on the suggestion to hold meetings at various times in various locations, so that at least <u>all</u> of the members can attend <u>some</u> meetings. This did appear to be successful. Other suggestions were - planning meetings a year in advance to allow members to arrange their schedules; area phone committees; having the programme before the business so that the meetings could be more interesting for non-members. Could I please have comments and suggestions on this problem? At a time when the role of the Library Technician is taking on a higher profile and the Provincial Executive is committed to locating new job sources, it would be unfortunate to have a poor image regionally. Please help us strengthen our association by your interest and participation.

A priority at this time is the active promotion of the Fall Workshops being arranged by Nancy Mack and Barbara Rudd. This is a chance to get together before the winter sets in and to interest others in the library field (school librarians, small community library staff, etc.) in our organization. I hope to see you at the workshop and I welcome your suggestions.

BRANCHING OUT

The 1981 OALT/ABO Conference, held in St. Catharines May 14-17, was a great success. There were a few problems, mostly due to the facility used, and not to the host region, Niagara Regional Branch, whose members were friendly, considerate and innovative at all times. Huronia Regional Branch was well represented, especially at the annual business meeting. It was good to see so many members in one place and receive some comments on our regional activities.

Following are highlights of workshops which were attended by our members: CHILDREN'S PROGRAMMING - Janet Hodgkins, Welland Public Library

Although I have had little to do with children's programming, I find myself drawn year after year to a workshop in this area. Perhaps, this is because of the quality of the workshops given or the child in me that insists I attend. I was not disappointed; the programme was excellent. Some of the ideas shared were - using mimeographed sheets of games for older children; a game called "Message in a bottle"; and, a bulletin board for messages and ads. Messages used in both the game and the bulletin board were from book characters. We all participated in some of the activities and a good, as well as informative time was had by all.

SERVICES FOR THE HANDICAPPED

This workshop was given by a panel of handicapped and non-handicapped persons. Some of the major points discussed were - building standards for the handicapped concentrate on wheelchair use, even though ramps, for instance, can be a hazard to the blind; fire alarms are normally sound devices, thus, being useless to the hearing impaired; libraries are often set up with objects jutting out; lighting is often poor for the visually impaired; most buildings are built for healthy 18 year olds even though 60% of the users may be handicapped in some way.

The closing message was "have library services for the handicapped, NOT handicapped library services".

PUBLIC SERVICES - Gladys Western, Independent Library Consultant

"To the public the person at the circulation desk is the librarian" A desire to serve, a willingness to please, courtesy, good telephone manners, and a broad knowledge of books and other information sources are all qualities that a person in public service should demonstrate. If you are busy, acknowledge the patron who is waiting by telling them you will be right with them. Smile and be patient. LIBRARY TECHNICIAN AS FIRST LINE SUPERVISOR - Barbara Land, City of Brampton Public Library and Art Gallery

The main part of the workshop dealt with the interviewing process. An interview was role played to demonstrate situations that might arise. The interviewer should have a strategy. It is important to explain the position and expectations clearly. The job applicant should do 60% of the talking. First impressions are important. The interviewer should look for punctuality, politeness, appropriate body language, appropriate dress, interest, enthusiasm and alertness.

It is essential for new staff to have in-depth orientation and training. They must know what is expected of them. Comments should be made regularly concerning their work habits.

NEWS FROM OWEN SOUND PUBLIC LIBRARY

An Awareness Week to publicize the needs and capabilities of disabled people, sponsored by Project AIM (Access is Mobility) was held at the Owen Sound Public Library, June 6-13, 1981. Displays were set up in the library auditorium by various groups. However, few took the time to view them, perhaps because they were not in the main part of the library. The highlight of the week was the official opening of our elevator - a very bright attraction with "portholes" on two sides. This event was very well attended by both disabled and non-disabled people.

In order to bring the Information and Reference Services to the area beside the circulation desk the Owen Sound Public Library was closed to the public from June 29-July 3, 1981. The total adult book and record collection was reorganized. Several reasons prompted this action - it was felt that many patrons were missing the reference section; which was on the next level; circulation desk staff can more easily refer people to the reference staff; and, reference staff are able to assist at the circulation desk, when needed.
