Katherine Robb is a shut-in and yet from her apartment she enters the worlds of famous sports figures or mounts an expedition to the Antartic simply by turning the pages of her favorite novel.

Robb is just one of `many people vho either through illness or simply old age can't manage a trip to the 3arrie Public Library so, the library comes to them.

Since 1973 the Barrie Public Library has been operating a visiting library service however Katherine Wallis, community srvice librarian, (cels that the service has a long way to go before it reaches its full potential.

"The visiting library service has been in operation since 1973 in various forms. It has sort of had an uneven history and has even been unused at times. It has been low profile but as Barrie grows we can see the need for this service growing as well," said Wallis.

This service is available to anyone confined to thier home or in a health care insitution either long term or short term. Wallis feels that this service is especially suited for seniors who are living at home and who do not have any relatives or close friends who are able to get library material for them.

When the situation calls for an outsider to collect such material for people Joanne Comper, library assistant, is ready and willing to search and find interesting pieces of fliterature to brighten their days. Comperis also willing to stop and chat for a minute or two. She enjoys sharing comments and criticisms on the newest books or why that person enjoys the works of a certain author so much.

Comper is a library asistant at the Barrie Public Library but as with the other five people delivering books she does it on a volunteer basis just for the love of sharing the written word.

"I feel good that I am doing this and I enjoy chatting with these people. They are all so interesting. Our patrons really enjoy getting the book and they love to read. One lady I visit all she does is read all day," she said.

DEVOURS BOOKS

While Robb does more than read all day long reading is still a major part of her life. Robb can usually be found reading at least three books at a time. Her favorite books are biographies or autobiographies of sports figures. A good mystery is always enjoyed.

"I was always a great reader. I was brought up in a family of readcrs. I can still remember my grandfather, with his long white beard, reading Scott of the Antartic to us in the dead of winter. My family just devoured books, "she said.

Robb said she would read just about anything except those steamy books her 'Aunt Minnie'would stay brary are subject to slight discrimination. We would like everyone to, have access to the library and we are doing this by promoting this service-,"said Wallis.

away from and of course science fiction. Every spring Robb can be found engrossed in Jim Bouto's biography.

"To me reading is a moment of calm in a crazy world. I am a shut-in but I am starting to crawl about. What would I do without reading? I would be entirely cut off from life-,"she said.

Robb remembers the first time she ever met Comper. It was a stormy winter day and to top it all off the elevator in her apartment building was out of order. Comper had to climb up five flights with an arm load of books to reach Robb.

"I felt so guilty about Joanne having to go through all that but at the same time I was so happy to get the books," said Robb.

Comper said that not only does she feel good about bringing book-lovers library material but very often she might be the only person they might see all day. For that reason she takes time to chat and get to know the person. After getting to know the person she then can determine what kind of books and which authors they might enjoy. "The mandate of the library is to

"The mandate of the library is to provide library service to everyone. People who can't make it to the lias well as private homes. The loan period is three to four weeks and the number of books Comper will bring depends on how many books the patron can read.

"We have a lot of probelms in the past with this service basically because we didn't know how to promote. We are trying to correct that now, "said Wallis.
