2012 OALT/ABO Conference: A Newcomer's Tale

When I joined the Ottawa Chapter of the Ontario Association of Library Technicians (OALT) in January 2012 as an Algonquin College student, I assumed I would take a few months to learn about it, its mandate, what it offered, etc. Little did I know that I would eventually be randomly chosen to be sponsored by my Chapter to attend the annual OALT Conference which was held in King City (north of Toronto), from May 2-5, 2012.

I must admit I had apprehensions about going: from the meals to transportation, and from the timing of the event to the pertinence of my presence there. I was worried about some elements of logistics, about the fact that the Conference interfered with my job search but most of all, about feeling out of place among people who had been in this profession a long time and who had “been there, and done that”. I was the rookie; how was I going to fit in or contribute to the discussion in a meaningful way?

As it turned out, I shouldn’t have worried as much as I did. I took a train for the first time, I saw Downtown Toronto for the first time (what an amazing experience that was!), not to mention its traffic jams (real ones like you see on TV!) on the highway to King City. I was also quite surprised at how well the welcoming committee was organized, from my arrival at Union Station to my destination at the Seneca College residence. These people had done this before! This well-oiled machine also extended to the people who greeted us and gave us directions before every activity or workshop to the lecturers themselves.

Throughout the Conference but namely on the first day, I met people who worked in various types of libraries and who shared their experiences, their fears about upcoming job cuts, their opinions on current trends in the library world, and I received useful advice that I can use in my job search. One of my classmates was also at the Conference, which I found helpful in breaking the ice.

During the second day, I had an opportunity to visit the Legislative Assembly of Ontario as well as its Library; the Legislature was nice, but I had seen mine in New Brunswick as well as the Parliament in Ottawa, and I found that all three had many similarities in terms of purpose, layout, architecture and the like. I must admit that I was more interested in touring the Library and learn of its collection, what it contained, where it came from, who is allowed to use it, etc.

Later on, I took part in a workshop aimed at searching business databases, which was a welcome refresher from my courses at Algonquin College. I then attended a workshop on children’s programming in libraries given by a young woman who detailed the various steps in setting up a children’s programme. I don’t think I had a clue as to the level of planning involved in creating such a programme. If such a task was ever given me, I would have a lot of work to do...

The third day of the Conference started with the workshop I ended up loving the most: one about personal money management. I thought I was doing well in the matter as I do take care of some of the elements the lecturer spoke of on a daily basis, but some of the things she spoke about and the concrete examples she gave really opened my eyes. For example, a weekly \$10 fast-food meal will end up costing you more than \$15,000 over a 30-year period!

On that same day, I learned about LibGuides and their potential benefits for libraries as well as the innovative C3 cataloguing system implemented by a library near Toronto. I also learned about ways to manage and classify E-mails more effectively.

I attended two workshops on the last day of the Conference: one about (very) useful features in MS Word called Paragraph Power and one about the upcoming RDA cataloguing system, which is meant to replace AACR 2.

All in all, I’m glad I went to the Conference as some of the things I learned about could be applied in my daily life. I want to take this opportunity to thank the Ottawa Chapter for sponsoring me to attend the Conference, the Seneca College volunteers who made my stay very enjoyable, the lecturers who gave me valuable advice on a wide range of topics and the OALT as a whole for organizing such a diversified, informative, pleasant, and fulfilling event!

If any of you have an opportunity to attend this event in years to come, be sure to sign up; it will be a valuable learning experience!



