Report on talk with LIFM students at Cambrian College

On Tuesday November 6, 1979, Paulette Thibault, Judy Laplante and I went to Cambrian College to speak to the second year Library Technician class.

We told them about the history of the Ontario Association of Library Technician (OALT/ABC), the way the regions related to the whole, and the structure and workings of the Sudbury Region.

The students were surprised with some of the information we had. For example, the statement that OALT/ABO printed concerning the definition of a library technician (which the class had no knowledge of), the statement on ethics and professionalism, and the variety of positions library technicians were employed at (as exemplified in the Directory). We showed them copies of both the provincial and the regional newslotters and mentioned that they were tools of appressing their fears, their aspirations and their problems.

The talk then turned towards a problem the LITH program at Cambrian was having regarding the inadequacies in the teaching of one of the instructors (see minutes of the Board of Directors' meeting September 8, 1979).

We decided, rather then accept memberships at that time, we would have a membership drive in March, to coincide with our fiscal year. Paulette Thibault will keep you informed of the results.
