DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Since the last Apropos, there have been two provincial meetings - February 7th, 1981 and March 28th, 1981.

The highlights of the February 7th meeting are as follows:

A new publication list is being compiled. Orange membership cards are to be used for the period of May 1/81 to April 30/82. Any new members submitting their fees after Dec. 15/81 are to send them directly to the provincial, paying only provincial fees. The provincial public relations coordinator received the OK to print 10,000 bookmarks. They are now available at the regional level.

OALT/ABO has applied for an ISSN for the provincial newletter.

The proceedings of the 6th annual convention have been compiled and are available for \$6.00 prepaid from:

A board policy stating that highlights of future convention proceedings will appear in the issue of the provincial newsletter following the convention, was decided.

It was also agreed upon that the outgoing provincial executive submit to the incoming executive all documentation and records <u>immediately</u> following the annual business meeting.

At the March 28 meeting, all annual reports were submitted. No nomination forms for provincial positions were received. The CLA conference is June 10-16 in Hamilton.

Slide tape submissions for the provincial presentation were received from Huronia, Ottawa and Niagara. Regions were to contact Nancy Mack regarding their available materials for the package by April 15, 1980.

The provincial audit is to be ready as of April 30, 1981, with copies to be included in the convention kit.

The public relations coordinator prepared and submitted a list of possible sponsors for the newsletter.

The provincial archivist now has a safety deposit box at his disposal and is looking into the possibility and expense of joining an archivists' organization. This will be discussed at the May 2 meeting.

The delay with vol.5, no.3 of the provincial newsletter is due to problems with the word processor. Directors recommended that we solicit advertisers to subsidize the cost of the newletter. Janet Fear will investigate rates and will report on May 2. Directors are to vote on findings.

Feedback: At the March 28, 1981 meeting, Janet Fear and Dorothy Kew resigned as newsletter editors. They recommended that production of the provincial newsletter be rotated, with one region to be in charge of a volume, that is three issues. Your director needs to know how you feel about this, for the next meeting. The region's membership would be those doing the work. If you are opposed, phone Monique Fuchs, your director.

The London Regional Branch requested and received consent to suspend its membership as of May 1, 1981. All of the London monies are to be turned over to the Provincial Treasury, with \$500 to be placed in a term deposit in London's name, should they decide to regroup as a region.

The afternoon of March 28 was dedicated to the discussion of Provosal for Change, a submission on changes to the structure and certain functions of OALT/ABO prenared by Bette Heard and Paulette Thibault. The presentation was made by Paul Brokenshire, Sudbury Visitors and Convention Bureau, who also helped with the proposal. Proposal for Change will be on the agenda of the annual convention. If a yes vote is the concensus for its adoption, it will result in many changes to OALT/ABO.

Feedback: Because OALT/ABO is an organization set up for you, you should be aware of its future directions. Proposal for Change may be one of them. If you are

interested in knowing more about this submission, contact Monique Fuchs for a copy. Make it soon, as it will be voted on mid-May.

The next provincial meeting and board of directors' meeting is to be held Saturday, May 2, 1981 at Northern District Library, 40 Orchardview blvd., Toronto, Ont. All members welcome! Your new director is Monique Fuchs, Ministry of Education.

OALT/ABO - SUDBURY BRANCH MEETING

Many opinions were expressed regarding Cambrian College's proposal to suspend or cancel the Library Technician Program. Although our members recognize the realities of the job market, it was felt that with a strong commitment from those involved, the program remains viable. As a result of the consensus, it was agreed that three of our members would write a brief expressing our concerns and offering suggestions for ways in which the program could be improved. Copies of the brief would be sent to the Chairman and Dean of the program at Cambrian, the Advisory Committee Chairman and the President of OALT.

Paulette Thibault reported on happenings at the provincial level, and also provided us with additional

information on the uncoming convention. It will be held in Ste. Catharines at Brock University this year and the workshops promise to be varied and informative. Several members of our local group plan to attend.

Set aside Wednesday, April 29th for the next get-together of library technicians in the Sudbury area. All potential members will be contacted regarding the location and time of this meeting.

CAMBRIAN'S LITN PROGRAM SUSPENDED

April, 1981, the library technicians program is no longer in existence at Cambrian College. The decision was made and the people most involved - the library technicians and the library technician students - were hardly consulted. We all realize that the program had its ups and downs, but where does the fault for this lie? Certainly not with the students and graduates of the program. For many years now the program has been allowed to drift, teachers were not always the best and any student who applied for the program was allowed in. In both instances, no weeding was done, consequently, we had some bad students being taught by some bad teachers.

In early March, 1981, Linda Davis, Monique Fuchs and I sat down at Cambrian and tried to draw up some concrete plans and suggestions for the program which we submitted to the College. We feel our recommendations were valid but not one of us received any positive or negative feedback from the management of the College. The only person who appeared interested in our suggestions was Vicki Skelton.

I would like to thank Vicki for all the help, guidance, and hardwork that she has done for technicians during her employment at the College. Vicki, for the last few years has pretty well held the program together. She has implemented new ideas and has been responsible for the cataloging teachers that we have had at the College.

I feel sad to see the passing of the program and wonder what the future holds for area technicians. I wonder about our visibility in the community - the program through the Advisory Committee, kept technicians involved with employers. Most area technicians are not involved with the Ont. Library Technician Association making it difficult to keep us in a higher profile. So what will happen to us, the "good" technicians? Hopefully that will be enough to keep us a viable group, but I doubt it.

Linda, Monique and I did what we could when we wrote the brief to the College, but it was too late. Even worse, it is too late for the 20 or so people who applied for the LITN program for the fall of 1981

PRIZE WINNING BOOKS

The two major American awards for children's books were recently announced.

Katherine Paterson will receive the Newbery Medal for her novel Jacob Have I Loved (Crowell, 1980). Set in the 1940's, it paints a stirring portrait of a young girl's attempts to cope with her feelings of inadequacy in the shadow of her favored twin sister. This is Paterson's second Newbery, having won in 1978 for Bridge to Terabithia.

The Caldecott Medal will be given to Arnold Lobel for this attractively presented picture book Fables (Harper, 1980). Lobel is well known for his popular and highly regarded series of easy-reading books about Frog and Toad.


