



CANCER SURROUNDS US

How many people who have touched your life have been subjected to at least the fear, if not the actual and often-fatal fact, of cancer? Acquaintances, friends, relatives, - even you - are susceptible. In fact, approximately 20% of all deaths are from cancer.

Research is the greatest potential weapon available for many types of cancer. Donations made to the Canadian Cancer Society certainly are required for research funding. But monetary donations alone are hardly enough to sustain the many aspects of the Society. Workers donating their time and abilities in a host of different areas are essential to the smooth operation and the continued, valued services of the CCS - services which attempt to eradicate cancer through methods other than straight research. Educating the public, alleviating many fears of cancer's fallacies and teaching preventative measures are all areas in which a nonresearcher can be beneficial.

The CCS is concentrating its efforts on all parts of the cancer process - prevention, diagnosis, detection, treatment and rehabilitation. As individuals, we all have our priorities, commitments and demands on our time. With cancer being such a major and possibly unnecessary cause of death, is it something we can afford to place as a low priority? If a person is unable to devote the time, money is a viable alternative. But regardless of the level of personal commitment chosen, as people involved in the educational aspect of society, Library Technicians can attempt to support the CCS in their educational goal by providing the public with easy access to the Cancer Society's literature, kits and videotapes.

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
