Speaking to 15 people from various careers, Mr. Farrington elaborated on the necessities of conciseness and brevity to keep a reader's attention. Anecdotes on the results of being not prepared for interviews interested those present, as did the times when potential disasters were avoided through good editing and writing.

With ninety minutes not being nearly sufficient for many in attendance, Mr. Farrington offered the assistance of the Sudbury editors. They can help in establishing guidelines for groups who wish to use print media for promotional purposes. Just what types of events and/or information would be of interest to the readership is best discussed with one of the editors. Advance notice of special events increases

the chances of an item being seen in print.

MEMBER PROFILE Eleanor Clarke, Kapuskasing

Graduating with the third group of Library Technicians from Cambrian College in 1971, my life in libraries has been interesting. I have been locked in prison (accidentally) and a men's prison at that! I made the acquaintance oF many interesting young people as librarian for several years at Cecil Facer School (one youngster taught me how to pick locks!) As librarian and stenographic-secretary to a research scientist in Sault

Ste Marie, I noticed a sudden silence during coffee break-then I realized what had happened. When a co-worker, being friendly to the newcomer, me, invited me to join the bowling team on Tuesday nights I declined with explanation that I had to go to jail on that night. I never thought to explain that I had volunteered my services as jail librarian.

Well, my life became even more interesting! I went to visit my eldest daughter and her family in Winnipeg and ended up with a position as the Collegiate Librarian in a lovely town in southern Manitoba. After three years during which a school Library Club grew to include 11 youngsters, I returned to my birthplace, Windsor, Ont. During that time I had the privilege of being the Librarian-In-Charge and Audio-Visual Supervisor at St. Clair College. I was replacing the evening librarian who was on maternity leave from September until January.

My life took a sudden turn when I accepted a position with the Kapuskasing Public Library as "Technician" in August, 1985. For the past year and a half, I have been Co-ordinator of an Adult Literacy Program which grew from 0 to an average of 23 active learners. We started a bilingual program but wa now have two programs, one French and one English. I am with the English program. I was dismayed and surprised to be dropped as a library employee when the library severed connections with the

Adult Literacy Programs Due wholehearted to my committment to Adult Literacy, I suddenly became a "grant" employee. This program is now sponsored by Kapuskasing the Board of Education and the Rotary Club of Kapuskasing. I am in a position of wondering if I will still be employed after August 31st.

I have earned my B.A. (Humanities) from Laurentian University since June and can also carry a conversation in French with my friends.

It has been a very full and a very interesting life since my college days!

Here are some of the workshops Sudbury members attended:

<u>Library services to the</u> <u>disabled</u>

Anne Pottier, McMaster University, was able to cover a variety of issues dealing with the problems of providing information and services to library patrons that have disabilities. These included physical barriers to accessibility, special format materials, special services and the training of employees.

Most areas of public access can easily be changed to accomodate any inquiries or for special requests assistance. The onus for identifying problem areas lies with the patron. But once alerted to the difficultu. the libraru should make arrangements as soon as possible.

The video presentation was from the National Library and is comprised of three

separate units. It is useful help promote general to and highlights awareness basic staff training tools.
