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## SUDBURY HOSTING 1992 CONFERENCE

After nine years since the last OALT/ABO conference was held in Sudbury, our branch has decided to host it again in 1992.

Those of us who were involved in the last conference can recall that early planning is crucial to getting a proper conference location and good workshop leaders. But even more important, is organizing a dedicated group of people to plan this tremendous event. The Sudbury executive hopes to recruit enough members to help make the task ahead easier on everyone.

In the Winter issue the first part of the article <u>Flliot Lake</u> <u>Public Library Moves On!</u> by William Land was featured. Here now is Part II of this article:

Elliot Lake citizens were canvassed for donations during a house-to-house blitz campaign. Also, a "Get-Away Draw" was held. Chances were sold for \$1.00 each or six for \$5.00 on a generous prize; two airline tickets, donated by Voyageur Airlines, and a \$400.00 monetary award. A slogan, "Elliot Lake Library Moves On!" and a "walking book" logo were adopted. These efforts were successful as the Board netted some much-needed cash for this project.

During the summer and early autumn, design drawings were finalized and construction estimates submitted to Ms. Fazekas by contractors. In September, a firm was selected and work on the new library site in the Algo Centre Mall commenced.

At this point, excitement among library staff, Board members and patrons was mounting. At long last, the Elliot Lake Public Library would be in a vibrant, new facility. "Town Council approved interim financing for the project as per the cash flow summary submitted with the CFIP application." Much of the financing for the relocation was to be obtained from the provincial government grants, Town Council and the fundraising activities.

In anticipation of increased use of library services, Council approved the Board's recommendation of increasing the full-time staff complement from three persons to four. A second library clerk was hired.

The plans promised that the new library would be large and functional. It would be divided into two rooms, separated by a large opening. Upon entering the facility, one would find the adult non-fiction collection, a comfortable reading area with periodicals and newspapers, the circulation desk, the librarian's and technical services offices and storage area. The next room would house the junior and French language materials, a meeting room, staff room and staff washroom. Study tables and comfortable chairs were to be strategically placed.

In October, as the site neared completion, plans were finalized for the move. It was decided that the library would close for three weeks from October 9th to October 30th. The momentous task of packing the library collection in preparation for moving was undertaken on the day following Thanksgiving Day.

The library staff, aided tremedously by a dedicated team of volunteers, began to box books and other holdings and dismantle shelving and office furniture. By the end of the first week, everything was ready for the movers!

The journey to the Algo Centre Mall began! A moving company was hired to do the actual move and the library staff, at both locations, directed their activities. Once, in the new site, the task of unpacking cartons and assembling shelving began.

It quickly became apparent that the library wouldn't be ready to open on October 30th so the date was changed to the following Monday. The staff and volunteers worked efficiently and quickly to accomplish this goal.

The doors to the new library had opened on Monday, NOvember 6th with a flurry of activity. The citizens of Elliot Lake had missed their valuable service. Many came in to return books, obtain new ones and to have a look around. Circulation records were surpassed during the first week! Many people applied for a library membership for the first time.

Much of the reaction from the townspeople for the library's relocation to the Mall had been positive. The library staff was elated; at long last, they had left the old, neglected, unpleasant quarters for the clean, functional, fresh-looking facility! Each member of the full-time staff had her (or his) own work station. The Library Board was happy as they had accomplished their long-term objective of relocating the library.

It would be remiss not to mention that the relocation project was fraught with, at times, disappointment and frustration, especially for Ms. Fazekas. Nevertheless, her dedicated efforts on behalf of the library did not go unnoticed by her staff, the Board, the Council and the library patrons. Without her competency and hard work, the library may not have relocated as quickly as it had.

Grand opening ceremonies were held on Thursday, November 30, 1989 at 7:00p.m. in the new home of the Elliot Lake Public Library. A ribbon-cutting ceremony took place with the Mayor, Library Board Chairman, Mall Manager and a representative of the Ministry of Citizenship and Culture doing the honours. A gala reception followed; library staff, Board members, Council representatives, volunteers, special guests and patrons were in attendance. The mood, of course, was festive!

Library life has settled into a comfortable routine for the users and employees. Services have returned to "normal", with a noteworthy exception; everything is brighter, spacious, more functional and attractive than previously. The new facility seems "almost luxurious" and is a welcome, and necessary, addition to our community.
