Workshop Summaries - 18th  
Annual OALT/ABO Conference,  
INFOVAE

The conference was opened with a wine and cheese held outside on one of the terraces of Ryerson College. Hot and cold hors d'oeuvres were served while old acquaintances were renewed and new ones made.

An excellent selection of workshops resulted in my attendance to the following:

Policy and Procedure Writing  
(Barbara Tinsley, Metro Toronto  
Public Library)

A number of short exercises enhanced this lecture-style workshop by emphasizing points made during the lecture. In this manner, some practice was provided using the skills being taught to write policies and procedures (i.e., correct grammar, no redundancies, concise and clear writing). A very enjoyable and practical session on an usually boring topic!

Ontario Public Library  
Strategic Plan Update (Liz  
Hoffman)

Copies of the OPLSP document, One Place to Look, were distributed to participants.

This booklet represents the culmination of three years of work by the OPLSP Committee to improve library service throughout Ontario. It is the intention of public libraries to involve local communities in accepting more responsibility for their libraries (staffing, funding, etc.) and in determining the focus local libraries will have. This workshop was both informative and interesting.

The Greening of the Library  
(Juliette de Juneo, Pollution Probe)

The conference description made this session sound as though there would be some specific suggestions for avoiding further environmental damage through the materials or processes used in library work. In actuality, it was an introduction to pollution in general and what humans can do to aid the environment. Although not what was expected, it was a useful session in general terms.

Image - Does Ours Work for Us?  
(Stephen Abram, SLA)

Results of a survey undertaken by the Special Libraries Association were discussed, along with suggestions on how to improve our image to ourselves and the outside world. The importance of properly worded job descriptions combined with a lack of pay for cognitive abilities helped to make this session most informative.

Designing Forms (Wendy Martin,  
Senior Forms Analyst, Bank of Montreal)

The importance of knowing a

form's purpose and the procedures undertaken to analyze the data was stressed. Design principles, including typography, spacing and colour were discussed. This was a simplified version of a fourteen week course.

### Profile

William (Bill) Land is a graduate of Cambrian College, 1980 class. He has been a member of OALT/ABO - Sudbury Regional Branch since 1983 and has served as the editor of APROPOS since 1990.

Since August, 1990, he has been employed as a Library Technician 3 with the Ontario Ministry of Correctional Services - Library Services/Staff Library in North Bay. As this library serves ministry staff not only in Head Office, but in any correctional office in Ontario, much of the contact with patrons is done by telephone, mail or fax; users rarely visit the facilities. The collections are small and specialized, dealing with corrections, criminology and related topics. Bill considers this position to be very exciting and challenging and is grateful to have yet another opportunity to assist in establishing a small library. Great accomplishments have been made in service and collection development during the past year.

Bill considers the most enjoyable aspect of this job to be the wide exposure he is gaining in the area of computer applications for libraries.

The opportunity to learn an automated system, INMAGIC, is helpful. A chance to learn online searching techniques is forthcoming.

One drawback of this position is the library operating budgets. There isn't enough funds, but this is a common complaint among library staff!

To end this description of the Staff Library on a positive note, it's great to be living in North Bay. The advantages of city life are many and it's wonderful to be near family and friends in Sudbury, Elliot Lake and Southern Ontario.

From June, 1987 to August, 1990, Bill was employed at the Elliot Lake Public Library. He had been exposed to a large number of library-related responsibilities and was glad for his initial exposure to computer operations at this library.

Bill felt a disadvantage to this position was not being recognized for his library technician background, but was glad for the opportunity to stay in Northern Ontario and, eventually and fortunately, relocate to North Bay.

As the only library technician at the Elliot Lake Secondary School from October, 1983 to June, 1987, Bill's major responsibility was assisting the Department Head with the library operations. Cataloguing, classification, book processing and reference work occupied much of his time.

What he liked and disliked most about this job are closely related. It was a ten-month position which meant he was off during all school holidays, including Christmas, March and summer vacations. It was great



to have the time to relax, but a drawback was not to have the income and to have the constant battle with the Unemployment Insurance Commission office.

The Sault College - Elliot Lake Campus, Learning Resource Centre was the site of Bill's very first full-time job from August, 1980 to June, 1983. It was exciting to be in on the development of a small library. He learned a great deal about library systems and operations, but to his surprise, and sometimes horror, it was frequently not like what was discussed in school. The most positive aspect of this position was the chance to work with a terrific person who remains a good friend still. Also, he had the opportunity to apply and further develop his library skills and stay in the community where he was raised. One of the biggest drawback was personal; he admits to having had a lack of self-confidence, but is pleased to report that this has grown and developed since he joined the work force.

Future career goals include the opportunity to manage a one-person library and/or?, the chance to write for publication is desired. He would like to be known as the next William Shakespeare, Jackie Collins or Carolyn Keene.

Positive aspects of libraries, according to Bill, include the fact that they are wonderful storehouses of information, great places to study, read, relax and think! And, the best of all, services are usually available without charge!

One of the aspects of libraries that Bill dislikes are library staff members with

attitude problems. He saw some people working in libraries treat their patrons without dignity and respect. He recalls an experience with one librarian who felt she was superior to others because she was "a professional librarian." Another library worker had made users feel like they were intruders in "her" library! These attitudes are unjust and deplorable!

Bill feels a change for the betterment of libraries would be more money and better budgets! He finds one of the most frustrating aspects of this work is the lack of operating funds! Where the additional monies is to come from though, he can't acknowledge. He stopped believing in the tooth fairy and Santa Claus long ago!

One of his earliest childhood memories is making a "library" of his own book collection with scraps of paper representing book cards and pockets. Large scrawls on the first inside blank page proclaimed: "THIS BOOK BELONGS TO BILLY LAND." During his secondary school years, his interest in library work continued due to his association with the high school and public librarians. Thank you Anne Locatelli and Diane Lehman!

He is an avid collector of juvenile series books and actively seeks the books that brought pleasure in his youth; Nancy Drew, the Hardy Boys and the Bobbsey Twins. Lesser known series are also collected; Judy Bolton, the Dana Girls, Ken Holt, Rick Brant, Cherry Ames, Vicki Barr and Connie Blair, among others. His home library numbers over

one thousand volumes.

Bill is seeking fine condition first editions of the titles he collects. Many of his books, although not firsts, are complete with dustjackets. Searching is done in used bookstore and by mail with other collectors and dealers in Canada and the United States.

Three periodicals devoted to this hobby are sources of valuable information; The Mystery and Adventure Series Review, The Yellowback Library and The Whispered Watchword. The latter is the publication of The Society of the Phantom Friends, a club open to all collectors and readers of girls' series books.

With the president of the Phantom Friends, Kate Emburg, Bill has helped write and publish two collections of series book parodies. Ms. Emburg had created the characters in this unusual satire and invited him to write for it. The series is being published by Phantom Friends Press to raise money for their treasure. A third volume is currently in preparation.

The tales satire many of the elements of the original books published from the 1930s to the 1950s and many aspects of modern society. It hasn't been particularly successful with many collectors who take their hobby very seriously (the pun is intended) and, secondly and perhaps most importantly, the heroine sleuth's name is very offensive and unkind, but is appropriate for this satire!

Bill is actively searching for children's series books and wants to make a pitch to **APROPOS** readers: "Search your attics and basements for the

books of your youth. Maybe we can make a sale!"

The personal and surprise questions aspects of this survey prove interesting. To quote Bill directly: "single and happy, good-looking and personable, charming and confident and, lastly, modest!" Bill thinks people would be surprised, and perhaps shocked, to learn the name of the heroine of the aforementioned girls' series parodies.

In conclusion, it's hoped you found interesting "Bill, the Mini-Series" or "The Adventures of William Land. Volume 1."
