ANNUAL BUSINESS MEETING EXPLORATIONS 1992

The Explorations '92 conference was a busy time for all Sudbury members involved. The Annual Business Meeting ran smoothly under our provincial president's capable hands and our parliamentarian, Sue Morley. Here are some of the motions discussed and passed at the meeting:

- 1) The Ad Hoc Committee on Political Awareness will be reviewed by the Board of Directors. It seems the committee was not able to fulfill its mandate. understanding is that this committee was to collect job descriptions from various types of libraries. With these, they would devise a "standard" job description and have it on file to advise employers, etc. of what library technicians do in various libraries.
- 2) An Educational Liaison Committee has been reestablished and will report at the 1993 ABM. Marsha Hunt (P.R.) made the motion and seems anxious to further promote library technicians'.
- 3) The OALT/ABO treasury's fiscal year will be from April 1st to March 31st of the following year. This allows the provincial treasurer to close the books and have them audited before the ABM.
- 4) A Task Force on Record keeping has been established. It will look at membership information collected and see what is essential and what is not. This will help reduce the database and costs

associated with it.

5) Guidelines for the Provincial Treasurer will be reviewed and revised by the Board of Directors and the Provincial Executive. Fiscal problems within the association this past year are what prompted this motion.

WORKSHOP SUMMARIES FROM THE EXPLORATIONS '92 CONFERENCE:

Changing Editions: a
Cataloguing Update:

Speaker: Jean Weihs

The session touched on a summary of the revisions and changes to the AACR2 (Anglo-American Cataloguing Rules, 2nd ed., 1988) which will be out in 1993. She discussed new rules, corrections, changes in allowed options, the economy of record storage

and the ease of use of the forthcoming edition. She also introduced some of the major changes in the Dewey Decimal Classification for both the unabridged (DDC20) and the abridged (DDC12) editions. Very informative workshop for all cataloguers. If you ever have a chance to attend her sessions, don't miss it. It's always best to know about the changes/revisions before you use the updated cataloguing and classification tools.

Fundraising:

Tracey Bailey, of Bailey & Associates, shared her years of experience as a fundraiser with a diverse group of interested delegates on the final morning of Explorations '92. As promised in the conference literature, she did present 101 fundraising ideas along with some basic rules for getting started and some useful sources for further reading.

Writing a business plan is essential for any group undertaking a fundraising project. The plan should include the organization's mandate, target audience, financial goals and planned activities. It is helpful, Tracey reminded, to remember the fundamental 5 Ws (who, what, where, when, why) along with the critical H (How you will accomplish your goal).

Tracey outlined the basic rules of fundraising, i.e. people give to people, not organizations; start where the money is (protect and expand your donor base); be specific

when you ask; get someone else to do the work (e.g. service clubs); 80% of money is given by 20% of the population. These facts are the keys to effective fundraising.

The group learned that there are about ten different types of fundraising events. Tracey described each and gave examples of successful ventures. She then shared her list of specific activities which could be adapted by any group in its quest for funds. Ideas ranged from the timeless scavenger hunt to the innovative cow lotto diamond-in-a-glass. In closing, Tracey recommended three publications: <u>Guidebook to</u> for Disabled Fundraising Persons from the Secretary of (819-953-2681); Everything You Need to Know in Direct Mail Fundraising and <u>Guide to Special Events</u> Fundraising from 819-994-2255 (your sleep-deprived reporter failed to note the name of department distributing these two titles!)

Fundraising was a great value for our dollar. It was comprehensive, packed with ideas, lively and humorous. Just the morning prescription for all those who were recovering from Friday's Karaoke!

Are You Really Teaching Them?

Presented by Leila Wallenius, Librarian at J.N. Desmarais Library, Laurentian University, Sudbury, Ontario.

Leila's workshop was very productive. She introduced to the delegates how to develop instructional pamphlets and/or handouts, and how to make them professional in appearance. Below is a brief summary and a bibliography from the workshop.

The workshop was introduced with two questions: What types of printed materials do you produce? and What makes a good handout?

With handouts keep in mind that every handout is a promotion of your library/centre and should communicate a positive image. Some tips to remember regarding handouts are: a) Is it professional in appearance, b) Does your library's name appear along with your library's logo - that is if your library has a logo, c) Vary the phrasing of your text, d) Keep it readable, and finally have the material proofread.

In writing instructions, there are several stages in accomplishing this task. These are: getting ready, writing the instructions, formatting, and verifying the instructions. Added to these stages are the design elements. Design is what makes your finished product look polished and professional. The computer has allowed everyone to enter into the art of desktop

publishing.

Storytelling with preschool children - A demonstration of Walden Public Library's "See & Sing" program with Mary Woboditsch.

Once again Mary Woboditsch not only informed but entertained us with a delightful and inspiring workshop on storytelling for "See & Sing" is a children. half drop-in hour, participatory program from babies to five year olds with adults accompanying them. It includes songs, nursery rhymes, fingerplays, stories and films. Since the end of July, 1992 I have been employed at the University of Sudbury Library, which is on campus and in federation with Laurentian University. It is a small, quiet and cozy library that specializes in the four following subjects: Folklore, Native Studies, Philosophy and Religious Studies. The

library is found completely and physically separate from Laurentian's library. The University of Sudbury is a big white building located at the top of one of many hills in Sudbury across from both Huntington and Thornloe Colleges. The library itself is located on the second floor. Drop me a visit!

There is a staff of three full-time employees: the library director, a library technician (myself) and a library clerk. From September to about the end of April the library hires on some part-time staff to work evenings and weekends.
