The Board of Directors/Executive (BD/E) met in Toronto on October 2, 1993 and discussed the following:

OTHER REGIONS:

Several of the regions expressed concern that unemployed graduates have to pay the same membership fees as employed graduates.

Perhaps the answer is a lower "Unemployed" membership fee.

HURONIA welcomes submissions from OALT/ABO members outside the region for their newsletter Networks.

LOHANIA brought to the meeting, information about the pay equity dispute between Library Technicians and the community colleges. Glenys Evans has spearheaded a complaint from the Library Technicians of Mohawk College against the Council of Regents and may include the local Mohawk union in this complaint. During the summer she sent information letters to Library Technicians in the college system and after this next weekend's meeting between the Council and the Technicians will send another. A lawyer has been informed of the dispute and may be retained after this meeting. The local union at Fanshawe College donated \$200,00 to the cause; the local Mohawk union may donate money and it is

ONTARIO PUBLIC SCHOOL BOARD ASSOCIATION: It has been suggested that

Teacher/Librarians be replaced by Library Technicians. Our position is that both are necessary to work as a partnership. Decisions are being made by individual school boards.

OSLA wants OALT/ABO to submit our definition of a Library Technician. We will send our newly revised job descriptions. OALT/ABO regions could make presentations at the Board level.

TRANSLATION:

We need to have an official list of specific documents that will be translated. We are not obliged by our Papers of Incorporation to provide translation. The newsletter will not be translated. In the past three years there has not been one submission for N/N in French. For the past twenty years there have been members translating for the Association without charging for it and it is a lot of work. and very expensive. OALT/ABO must expect to pay for translation if the job is to be completed properly and must be done by qualified persons. Submissions made to the Editor will be published in the language submitted ie.
