IS THE PHOENIX RISING ?

Almost 15 years after the closing of Cambrian College's Library Technician Program, Sudbury may again be educating Library Technician students. A few attempts at starting a continuing education program in Sudbury through Georgian College and Lakehead University at Laurentian University's campus have been made over the years, but to no avail. Various factors from mis-communication to insufficient interest have prevented opportunities for local up-grading or new Library Tech. grads in Northeastern Ontario.

Today Lakehead University is making another attempt to expand its Library Technician Diploma/B.A. program to include interested persons in the Sudbury area. Margaret MacLean, Associate Professor and chair of Lakehead's Department of Library & Information Studies, met with Paulette Burton and Bette Gore (OALT/ABO - Sudbury Regional representatives), along with the Sudbury Board of Education's Educational Media Co-ordinator Wayne Hugli, to explain her dreams and intentions.

Following is a description of the program as outlined by Ms. MacLean:

- -all interested persons, regardless of previous education or work experience, would be welcome to participate in any of the courses, provided prerequisites are met
- -courses would be available for credit (\$167/half course) or audit (\$109/half course) auditing students do not write exams and generally receive no official recognition outside of their tax receipt.
- -academic (as opposed to Library) electives for the diploma course would be taken at and through Laurentian University (negotiations with Laurentian not finalized)
- -minimum requirement is 8 students per course
- -anyone currently holding a BA would complete the diploma requirements in 7 courses
- -those interested in obtaining a BA degree in conjunction with Lakehead's diploma course would be required to take 5 full university level courses upon completion of the diploma program
- -persons having previously graduated from a Library Technician program are not likely to be offered equal recognition for their courses toward the Library Technician Diploma/Degree program
- -courses would likely run every second weekend (Fri. evening & Sat. morning) over a 12 week period earliest starting date is Jan. 1996



Collège Boréal ... les débuts du Centre de ressources

Le Centre de ressources a fait ses débuts dans une espace mesurant 12 x12 au 111, rue Elm, de janvier à juin 1995. Le 30 juin 1995, nous avons empaqueté et sommes déménagés au 261, avenue Notre-Dame (anciennement le Collège Sacré-Coeur ou l'annexe Marymount) Le Centre se situe au 3e étage dans l'ancienne chapelle. Le 19 juillet, nos étagères de la compagnie Conrad Stoltz & Associates sont montées. Le 24 juillet environ 10,000 livres français transférés du Collège Cambrian sont arrivés. Les pauvres déménageurs, il n'y avait pas d'ascenseur. Vers 11h00 cette journée-là, nous avons commencé à ouvrir nos 150 boîtes et à placer les livres sur les étagères. Au début du mois d'août il a fallu ouvrir chaque livre et mettre des nouveaux codes, rayer le nom "Cambrian", etc... Il y avait environ sept étapes par livre. Ceci fut très long!! Durant ce temps on a reçu 82 boîtes de livres (2,500 livres) de Bibliocentre. Il a fallu mettre des codes zébrés dans ces livres, les vérifier et les envoyer en région avant le 5 septembre.
