A real plus of the conference was the people I met-from fellow law librarians to newspaper librarians. Contacts like these help me immensely in my job. I'm looking forward to future conferences.



DIRECTOR'S REPORT

The 1985-86 year was a very busy time for the Provincial Executive and Board of Directors. Meetings were held at the Metro Reference Library in September, November, January, March, and April.

Two of the major items of discussion were the slide-tape presentation on Library Technicians, and the status of NEWSLETTERS/NOUVELLES.

The slide-tape project was professionally prepared, and Thunder Bay was the first region to show it (at the annual meeting in March). The cost of this presentation was close to \$4000, and application has been made to the Ministry of Citizenship and Culture for a grant to cover it.

Although there are several inaccuracies in the script and a couple of slides, the overall impression has been most favourable, and Lakehead University School of Library Technology is prominently featured!

With regard to NEWSLETTERS/NOUVELLES, the major concerns have been the need to improve the physical appearance, and the especially important need to reduce the cost of each issue. This was running at between \$2000 - 4000 per issue, the major expense being that of translation. A recommendation by the newsletter editors is that information and articles be printed in the language of submission, except for material on the activities of the Provincial Executive.

Among other matters dealt with were the Membership Directory (to be ready in September); Essay Contest (motion passed to suspend until we are in a position to publish first-place winners); OPLAC Task Force on certification of library technicians in the public libraries (good feedback from Maggie Hotchkiss); full membership status offered to associate members belonging to OALT/ABO for five consecutive years.

Regional members are urged to renew their memberships as soon as possible, as the Provincial coffers are extremely low!!

The conference next year will be hosted by Halton-Peel at Erindale College from May 21 to 24, 1987.

And don't forget that Thunder Bay is the host in 1988. Ideas galore are already pouring in for the big event. This will be our third time hosting, and people love to come here.
