Debbie also pursued publicity related tasks as a volunteer for local theatre, She has also worked for Abitibi Price, the Canada Games, City of Thunder Bay, and the Community Auditorium as a very prominent and successful PR person. Debbie is currently the Manager of Marketing and Sales for the Airlane Hotel and has found her diploma of use to her through all the growth of her career.
