REVIEWS

Director's report of April's meeting:

Financial Status: The provincial treasurer has just discovered that she opened the 1991-92 books with the wrong balance figure. As a result we are in a deficit position at the moment. The treasurer will be sending additional information to each region.

Membership Database:

The board reviewed the quote for membership services from Becker and Associates and it was decided that a task force would be struck to determine exactly what we want from membership services before getting additional quotes. Each region will participate.

Annual Reports:

It was agreed that given our economic situation the expense of translation for annual reports would be unnecessary.

French LT program:

A letter from our organization was sent to protest the elimination of the french language program at Algonquin College. It was decided to give further publicity to this matter by sending the letter to other key people and organizations; eg. MCU, library publication etc.

Membership/Fiscal Year:

The provincial fiscal year was moved up one month to enable the treasurer to be ready for the annual meeting. The motion to change the membership year to October 1 - September 30 was made and passed unanimously. Each region can determine their own fiscal year.

<u>Public Library Strategic Plan</u> Update:

OALT/ABO was voted off the committee (Pat Graham and Marina Ross) apparently because they are thought to be well represented through other organizations on the committee and that our membership does not represent a large number of LTs. The provincial board will send a letter protesting this move.

Provincial Executive:

Bette Gore, the present president is willing to stay on one more term but the current vice-president will not. Therefore, there is a need for a vice-president to come on the executive and be willing to take on the presidency the following year. Nominations from any region at the ABM will be accepted by proxy.


