# Janis DeGagné Regional Access Specialist

Janis DeGagné, 1982 graduate Lakehead University Library Technician Program. Employed with the Atikokan Public Library Board for many happy and challenging years from 1978 - 1986; originally hired in the Adult Department, later as Head of Childrens Department.

Currently employed with Worker's Compensation Board, Thunder Bay Regional Office since October 1986, initially as Co-Ordinator Records Control. The principal objective of Records Registration and Control is to provide an efficient and

effective system of records management including registration of new claims, identification of incoming claim documents and control of file movement and location. In Thunder Bay, Records provides an integral service to all operating areas by creating, maintaining and ensuring the availability of approximately 50,000 claim files, of which 3,000 - 4,000 are active at any one time. The job of Records Co-Ordinator ensures these functions are performed through the activities of Records Clerks. the Co Ordinator directly supervises these Clerks (11 - 13), and is responsible for assigning and scheduling work, providing advice, direction and training, volume and quality control. The job has responsibility for monitoring progress, preparing performance appraisals and discussing with staff, administering oral discipline as required and recommending stronger disciplinary action to the manager. As well, the CoOrdinator is responsible for the implementation of all Records policies, procedures and routines including records security.

The major challenge/problem of the position has been the efficient back and forth movement of claim files to those areas both within the Regional Office, and to our Head Office, as well as other Regional Offices in the province.

Since the spring of 1989 I have performed the function of Regional Access Specialist, a job that provides claim file access to authorized requesters with an issue in dispute according to our provincial legislation. Also, all Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy requests for file information are channelled to my department. At this time we are currently attempting to provide file copies to over 363 requesters.

Skill learned as a Library Tech student and experience gained in the public library setting were definite assets which secured the positions of Records Co-Ordinator and Access Specialist.


We hope these two newcomers and their families will enjoy living and working in Thunder Bay.

Former TECH TALK newsletter editor Muriel Davidson created a HONE YOUR RESEARCH SKILLS contest. Muriel tried diligently to get participants in her contest. After many phone calls and many hints three people responded. For those of you who didn't hone your research skills the answers are -



The second photograph showed a man beside a "cabinet" type machine with papers in his hands. It was hoped you would think in the direction of photocopiers. This being so any of the first inventors of any of the different copy machines would have been accepted (after all most of the bearded men look alike don't they?). The actual photograph showed David Gestetner (remember you were told his name is still used) with the Cyslost duplicating machine invented in 1881. Helen Heerema came up with a copier invented in 1848 by Frederick Bakewell which he called a Facsimile machine. Obviously such research is very acceptable !! (And you thought a facsimile machine was very modern!)

Our first photograph showed a man beside a showcase containing 2 perforated discs. The clue was "It's not exactly as you see it" and you were told it was an AV subject. the discs were <u>NIPKOW DISCS</u> that were used by several people in a quest to invent the first TELEVISION. They were used by Paul Nipkow, Boris Rosing, Ferdinand Braun and others any of whom would have gained points. In our photo the person was John Logie Baird. He made his first television success in December 1925 and gave the first public demonstration in January 1926. Either date would have been acceptable.





The authors of course were both mystery writers (you were told you don't need any clues to solve these authors) They were the most famous mystery writers. Sir Arthur Conan Doyle, born May 22nd 1859, died July 7th 1930 inventer of the great Sherlock Holmes and his fellow Dame Agatha Christie, characters. born September 15th 1890, died January 12th 1976 created Hercule Poirot, Miss Jane Marple and others. Helen also reported that fact that she also wrote under the pseudonym "Mary Westmacott".
