# Reviews

The Board of Directors/Provincial executive of OALT/ABO met on October 2, 1993 at the Richview Public Elbrary in Toronto.

The following items were discussed at this meeting:

- 1. Vicki Lisowyk, Lohanian Regional Director, reported that pay equity applied to all staff of community colleges except Library Technicians and support services staff. Consideration to send a letter of complaint has been discussed. If they go ahead with the complaint, the OALT/ABO Board will be asked for a letter of support as this affects all community colleges. Liz Aldrey will send an update on this to all directors to discuss with regional members.
- Request by Thunder Bay region to host the 1995 OALT/ABO conference was accepted by the Provincial executive.
- 3. The Provincial executive stressed the importance of nominating people from the membership for the Presidential award. No one was nominated last year.
- 4. Brady Leyser, Newsletter Editor, discussed changes to the format of the Provincial newsletter. The new format will be:

Size 8 1/2 x 11

8 pages

4 pictures/photographs Include promotional items Include membership form There will be a deadline for article submissions. Both hard copy and floppy disk of the information along with snapshots of workshops or events are requested. Brady would like a list of library schools in the regional areas along with name of anyone on the regional executive as a contact person for new students. A contest will be run to pick a new name for the newsletter and an honourarium (eg. free membership for 1 year) to the winning contestant. Articles will be taken from the regional newsletters for the provincial one. The new format will cost approximately \$100 more than in the past.

5. Patron's kit, a do-it-yourself workshop dealing with problem patrons, will be marketed soon at a cost of \$25.00.

- 6. French translation of the constitution will not be done until the document is finalized. Comments from the regional executive and members regarding revisions to the constitution should be forwarded to the Regional Director or Cathy Walsh for the next meeting in Toronto on November 27th. Note Cathy Walsh is on the committee working on the revisions to the constitution.
- 7. New Membership forms are in the last draft form. Comments from the regional executive are to be sent to Theresa Kennedy, Provincial Treasurer. For the time being, the old forms are to be used for membership renewals.
- 8. A letter from the Ontario School Library Association was read by Sue Orlando, Provincial President. School librarians are writing up job specifications for library technicians without consultation with OALT/ABO. Susan Morley, Ex Officio, noted that the Ontario government has guidelines for job specifications for library technicians done in consultation with OALT/ABO in which she was actively involved in at the time. Suggestion was made that a representative of the regional branches should promote information about library technicians at the Board of Education level. Representative can promote how a library technician and teacherlibrarian can complement each other in providing a comprehensive service in the education field in a cost effective way.
- 9. The Provincial Executive will look at official documents requiring translation membership form, statement of standards, constitution, etc. Region members are to discuss what they consider needs to be translated.
- 10. Consideration to purchase InMagic software was discussed. This will be looked into further but the regional directors agreed that it should be purchased.
- 11. The new directories will still be published every 2 years, but will be printed in smaller booklet size

again. Updates will be printed in the Provincial newsletter and it is up to the members to include the changes in their bi-annual directory list.

12. The next conference will be hosted by Halton-Peel region at Erindale College in Mississauga, May 25-29, 1994. Plans are well under way for Revolution '94.

### TOUR OF THE NIPIGON PUBLIC LIBRARY






# Previews
