

The following are the minutes from the 27 November 1993 OALT/ABO Directors meeting held in the Richview Public library in Toronto.

1. Letter was sent to the Ontario School Libraries Association along with a generic job description for school library technicians.

2. Barbara Cope, Vice-president, resigned from VP position due to other commitments and uncertain work situation. In the interim, Brady Leyser, Newsletter editor, will serve as VP; but this position has to be filled fairly soon. If anyone is interested in becoming vicepresident for the provincial executive, please contact Carolyn Enns, regional president or Helen Hyvarinen, regional director.

3. Theresa Kennedy, Treasurer, does not want mail (memberships, membership fees, etc.) sent by registered mail as it has to be picked up and signed for personally from the post office. Please send by regular mail.

4. Regional directors' reports all seem to reflect poor turnout to workshops.

6. Provincial archivist will be compiling a list of headings for the OALT/ABO association records. Jan suggested the archives should get complete conference kits and provincial newsletters.

7. Susan Morley, ex-officio, talked about FreeNet, community based computer system. The Ottawa FreeNet system is working really well. Toronto will have its own FreeNet system soon and is looking for information providers. OALT/ABO could be an information provider for the Toronto system. Information could include OALT/ABO fact sheet, upcoming conferences, etc. Information can be in ASCII or DOS text format. Susan will send all the information on FreeNet to Mike Mortimer for further investigation.

8. Treasurer reported that translation cost breakdowns in the past are not clear as to what each document costs to translate. A policy and guidelines for translation of documents will be compiled and included in the Board policy statements. Therefore, guidelines will have been established and can be followed without having to hash out what will be translated annually. Annual business meeting, executive directors' annual report forms, and membership forms will be translated. the fact sheet, statement of standards, directory, constitution, etc. have already been translated. Other documents will be translated at the discretion of the Board re Constitution, article 1B.

9. Treasurer will convert all information onto INMAGIC PLUS by Christmas. Membership information will be sent directly to the regional treasurers on hard copy and disk. Software program, SEARCH MAGIC, is available for approximately \$395. for the regional executive to utilize the disk copy of the membership list. The program only searches information on the disk copy.

10. Constitution changes were discussed. Some minor revisions were made and Judy Koenig will have the new constitution typed and ready for printing by the next Board meeting, February 26, 1994.


11. Changes to the new membership directory were discussed. The updated directory should include provincial and regional executives. Theresa Kennedy will investigate the cost of changing the format to a smaller size. It was suggested that the new directory be ready to distribute at the next OALT/ABO conference.

12. Revolutions '94 conference preparations are still on schedule.

13. The working budget was discussed but not approved by the Board as proceeds from the Ottawa conference have not yet been received.

14. A provincial award committee is to be set up. Regional directors are to discuss with regional executives how to promote nominations. Christine Davey will ask Linda Davis to chair this committee. A profile of members who have been nominated in previous years should be put in the provincial newsletter.

Since there are so many student members I tried to think of a topic for the newsletter that might be beneficial to them - hence job descriptions. When I first went to teacher's college, the teachers tried to give me a general idea on how to teach and why. Then I was in the real world (a classroom with a curriculum binder) and with the assistance and guidance of more experienced cohorts, I applied what I learned to the situation and loved my job. Time moved on and so did I. I attended Lakehead University and graduated with my Library Technology diploma and a new set of skills. These basic skills were taken into the workplace and again added to. I work for the public board (and we don't admit religion here) but I give thanks to whomever for placing me in a job that is perfect for my "green" personality.

There are four different "Library Technician" job descriptions used by The Lakehead Board of Education for the thirteen techs working there.

All four job descriptions begin with the definition "The Library Technician is a graduate in Library Technology from an accredited post secondary institution whose program is recognized by the Canadian Library Association. The Library Technician must demonstrate well developed human relations skills as well as effective organization, planning and collaboration skills in order to function effectively in an educational environment with student and staff." (The three different positions at the Board Office change the last four words to "staff members of The Lakehead Board of Education".)

The High School Library Technician's description then proceeds to give the role of a library technician again emphasizing the fact they have acquired a specialized knowledge of both manual and automated library systems, and methods in developing, organizing and maintaining a collection of library material, records and files. The Library Technician assists the Teacher-Librarian in her/his role as a resource manager and curriculum developer to students, teachers and school administration in the use of library resources and/or research.

Their job description is then broken into three sections listing the wide range of duties; public service, technical, and administrative. This last paragraph actually takes two pages to elaborate on these duties.

Now at the Board Office there are three library technicians performing three specialized jobs. The LIMMS Technician is a newly created position that has the responsibility of being central cataloguer, authority control, assistant to computer programmers designing LIMMS, and new to the system teacher-librarian trainer. This tech is responsible for computerized ordering and loading of MARC data from external sources in VAX tape and floppy disk formats. She then check the external data for integrity and makes it available for the schools use. This technician also has an intricate knowledge of the LIMMS system to aid in the Board's sale of the software package to prospective buyers.

The library technician who is Head of Circulation supervises a staff of three while they circulate a multimillion dollar collection of films, kits, videotapes, and audio visual equipment. This tech supervises overdue problems and daily practices her public relations skills. This technician also transfers TVO programs from three quarter inch masters to a half inch format that circulates and then catalogues each program for the Media Centre catalogue. This technician also has the headache of being responsible for the distribution and organization of all Resource Documents. This tech remembers everything that has occurred in her department for the last six years and so contributes to departmental policy.

The final technician position is the Acquisitions Library Technician. This technician catalogues all the films, no-rights (non TVO) videos, kits, and reproducibles that are housed in the IMC. This technician is responsible for the production and purity of the Media Catalogue and the production of three hundred plus specialized bibliographies requested by teachers each year. This tech is also responsible for acting as Acquisition Librarian during librarian's absence therefor must keep abreast of decisions in that area.


