REVIEWS

The following are the minutes from the April 23, 1994 OALT/ABO Directors meeting held in Toronto.

- 1. A letter and an information package re-qualifications and generic job description for library technicians was sent to Simcoe County Board of Education.
- 2. Halton-Peel region had serious problems getting members to be on the regional executive this year.
- 3. Huronia region will be celebrating 15 years as a regional association in June.

- 4. Archivist discussed what information should be kept as archival material and what should be discarded. Presently there are no guidelines as to what is to be kept in the archives.
- 5. Treasurer would like to have 10year membership lists from the regions.
- Sudbury region reported that Sudbury will soon have a francophone college.
- 7. Approval for funding from the provincial board for a regional workshop is still available. Guidelines for a provincially assisted workshop is outlined in the Board of Directors' Policies.
- 8. A flyer to promote the problem patron kit with OALT/ABO logo will be printed and distributed to CLA members. Labelling and stuffing of envelopes will be done at the conference in May.
- 9. Discussion re- who will host the 1996 conference. Huronia and Lohania regional directors will be done at the conference in May.
- 10. Susan Morley will help Theresa Kennedy set up the format for the new directory on INMAGIC. A mock up will be ready for the ABM at the conference. Members will be surveyed for their preference reformat of the directory. The new directory will be available when membership renewals are processed in September.
- 11. Copy of the constitution will be available for discussion at the ABM. Some more housekeeping changes are to be corrected by Donna Fossum and Judy Koenig.
- 12. Membership form still needs revamping. Susan Morley and Theresa Kennedy are working on making additional changes to the form. It will be inputted on INMAGIC. The new form will be discussed at the brainstorming session at the conference.
- 13. Two issues re- membership: (a) make changes to membership fee structure for unemployed (b) how to get members to continue membership.

- These issues will be discussed at the September Board meeting.
- 14. Provincial Board would like a list of graduates from the regions so that the president can send a letter of congratulations through the college/university.
- 15. Suggestion was made to have a super Saturday of workshops: four workshops in one day and pick two of the four workshops to attend. This would be the one that is provincially funded.

Report on OALT/ABO ANNUAL CONFERENCE, May 25-29, 1994 Erindale College, Mississauga, Ontario

The following is a summary of the workshops I attended. I enjoyed the workshops and found something interesting in most of them.

INMAGIC - Maria Phipps
This workshop was quite interesting as I had never seen INMAGIC demonstrated before. The nice part of INMAGIC is that all fields are searchable with one basic command. Many specialized libraries use it for their card catalogue, indexing, serial management, etc. Saskatoon Public Library uses it for their local history collection. Perhaps we could use it for our local collection, as well as for our Thunder Bay index.

INTERNET - Walter Giesbrecht
This was the best attended of all of
the workshops. About half of the
audience of eighty had used
Internet. Walter took the mystery
out of Internet and made it look
like fun. He was a dynamic speaker
who kept his audience enthralled.
He gave us background history with
statistics, explained why one would

want to use Internet, demonstrated how to use it, etc. The disadvantages of Internet were the fact that there was too much information, little or no order to it, and the information was constantly changing. Issues to be considered by all Internet users are access, copyright, and quality control or lack of it.

OSH EXCHANGE - Laurie Tirone. Canadian Centre for Occupational Health & Safety

This centre provides free enquiry service to all patrons. CCINFO Line is accessible by phone and they also have eleven other CD-ROM products they use for information requests. The full text of legislation is available through DOSWINDOWS. They have a multi-media CD-ROM available on repetitive motion accidents. Two bulletin boards are available to users - 1. OSH Exchange 2. BBS lists conferences around the world. Patrons have a free account on OSH Exchange if you subscribe to any of their services. The database will be available through Internet in the near future.

<u>HALINET</u> - Brian Bell - Oakville Public Library

Halton Information Network consists of four public libraries, the Board of Education, Sheridan College, and the four municipalities.

Oakville Public Library patrons can place holds through their home computers, and this service will be available in the other libraries shortly. Halinet is available via Internet.

TORONTO FREENET

This presentation was not as successful because of technical difficulties, and no live demo was possible. They are hoping to have it up and running in 1994 with 100 phone lines.

GOVERNMENT DOCUMENTS - Juliet Atsa - Federal Publications
Federal Publications is a private company who distribute federal government publications. They receive a fax each day from the government listing documents released on that day. They sell documents at the same price as the government bookstore.

They will handle questions free from the general public re publications whether you intend to buy it or not. Federal Publications Inc. use title, catalogue number, and keyword searching when looking for a document. Subject searching will be available shortly. This would be a great source for information on very recent publications which your library may not have received yet.

ONTARIO GOVERNMENT DOCUMENTS - Mary Fisher & Aileen Weir, Ontario Legislative Library Information was provided on how to

locate Ontario government publications, financial information, and the legislative process was outlined for bills, statutes, etc. We learned that the Thursday issue of "Votes and Proceedings" gives the status of current bills. If in doubt whether an Act has come into force, one can call the Legislative Council Office for an immediate answer. Also available from Publications Ontario are "Current Issues Papers" on topics such as abortion, land claims, etc. Unfortunately these are available only on microfiche.

The Legislative library database will be available on Toronto Freenet in the future and is now available on your home PC. The documents are part of the television signal on the Ontario Parliamentary Channel.

DIALOG TIPS AND TRICKS - Frank Gagne I had no prior experience with Dialog and this was a good introduction. Even though we have it available in our system I was not familiar with it. The handout was very detailed and easily understood. By mid-June six major Canadian newspapers will be available in full text on Dialog.


Hatched, Matched and Dispatched




Medieval Librarian Opens His First Lending Library
