The following are the minutes from the 17 September 1994 OALT/ABO Directors meeting.

1. Fee for the unemployed is to be decided by the regions. Amount of the fee can be noted on the bottom of the membership form as this will most likely change as the job market improves. A motion was made that the unemployed membership rate will be reviewed once a year by the provincial executive and board of directors. The regional director should be ready to discuss this at the first board meeting in September.

2. It was discussed that a provincial grant be provided for someone from the regions to come to the annual conference with the provincial and regional executive sharing the costs. Regional directors are to bring suggestions from regional members regarding guidelines, opinions, criteria, etc. as to who should receive such a grant to the next board meeting in November.

New membership forms are not ready yet. Forms require translation and have to be entered on INMAGIC. Regions are to continue copying the old form for renewals in September. The new format will have a renewal section and a new membership section.

4. Brady Leyser, newsletter editor, requires an ad about the next conference,

INTERCONNECTIONS '95, for the provincial newsletter in January. He will give a deadline for this at the November meeting.

5. It was suggested that the conference in 1995 should have a flea market for all the left over "stuff" that was for sale at previous conferences.

6. Some discussion on travel expenses reincluding a mileage rate for those who chose to drive to the board meeting.

7. Salary survey was drafted by Susan Bourdeau, Vice-President. Some minor changes were discussed. Susan did an excellent job of drafting a very comprehensive and easy to fill out survey. The revised draft will be ready for the next provincial meeting.


8. The new directory should be available with the January newsletter. Deadline for the regional treasurer to have renewals and new memberships in is by November 19th.

9. Regional archivist is to provide guidelines for archive subject headings for director to bring to the next board meeting in November.



Leiden University Library, the model for the Bodleian

The opening of the Bodleian Library is one of the most significant events in the history of librarianship. In 1598 Sir Thomas Bodley began collecting books for the sole purpose of restoring the Library at Oxford. It is believed that Bodley's design for his library was based on the Leiden University Library which opened in 1594. In 1601 Dr. Thomas James was appointed the first Keeper of the Library. Bodley remained the administrator, and every routine item had to be submitted for his approval. It formally opened on November 8, 1602 with 2,000 volumes, and is now second in size only to the British Museum.

My job is very busy, challenging and rewarding. I'm involved in all facets of the organization. I participate as a member of committees both within the organization and in the community. Public relations is a big part of my job, as I attend many meetings with other organizations, government departments, agencies, etc. Reports must be prepared on every meeting I attend so that I can keep my board up-to-date on what is happening both within the organization and in the community.

I'm responsible for the day-to-day operations of the office, all administrative functions, supervising of staff and placement students, preparing budgets, monitoring expenses, writing proposals for funding etc. I coordinate meetings, seminars, workshops, conferences as they are required. A lot of time is spent talking to people on the telephone, sending faxes, and writing letters. In the beginning an initial part of my job was to implement some of the Records Management techniques I learned; thank you Bob Welsh, I couldn't have done it without your Tuesday night classes in Records Management. It's so nice to see that they were not a waste of time. Computer training is absolutely essential in this exploding technological era. You do not realize how important it is until you are working with it every day. Because our organization is involved in education and advocacy, mass mailings are sent on a regular basis to our membership. Basically, my advanced computer skills were not up to this task at first, but I've since learned all about the Merge feature in Wordperfect. I've just completed the quarterly Newsletter and I'm in the process of getting it prepared for distribution to the membership. Boy, I sure could have used your help, Kathy and Margot, since I didn't know anything about putting together a newsletter much less producing it.

Being a graduate of the Library and Information Studies program has allowed me to add important skills to my financial training background. These new skills have made me more valuable to my employer and they have enabled me to take the initiative in the performance of my duties.

At last we came upon the door to the library!



As we stepped into the brightly lit, and colourful open space called the Oliver Township Public Library, we were greeted by a smiling Valerie Barton, library tech extraordinaire! She tore herself away from her cataloging, and took the time to give us the grand tour.

We discovered that her library houses over 7,000 volumes and subscribes to seven periodicals. Donations to the collection are encouraged and greatly appreciated.

These hours were modified to suit patrons, as are most aspects of the library.

In the cozy children's corner with its rocking chair and colourful rainbow painted on the wall, storytime and craft programs are carried out for the preschoolers. The older children may attend programs which complement their school curriculum, while the adults are given the opportunity to join in activities dealing with topics of current interest.

Valerie maintains her collection with the traditional card catagog, and uses Librarian's Helper for cataloging purposes.

She relies heavily on ILL and materials from OLS North. Every three to five months new non fiction and large print books are rotated from OLS. Videos can also be obtained.

To date grants from the Ministry of Culture, Recreation, and Tourism have provided them with a computer, CD-ROM, and shelving units. Fundraising within the library involves book sales and selling raffle tickets at the Murillo Fair.

We congratulate Valerie for her efforts in providing such excellent service to her patrons. She has succeeded in making her library a cozy, relaxed space which invites reading and CHATTER! The Oliver Township Public Library is not only a room full of untapped knowledge, but also a meeting place for the community of Murillo.

Bravo, Valerie and thanks for the tour!






