OALT/ABO 23rd Annual Conference

Report:
"A Delicate Balance"
Collingwood Ontario

This year the Conference Committee decided to hold a "mini-conference" to try to cut down on costs and hopefully attract more delegates. Once again the workshops were very well presented even though there were fewer to choose from.

Truly Innovative Fundraising

**A first-rate workshop was presented by Kerri Robinson, CEO of the Collingwood Public Library and Kathy Frizell, Public Relations Coordinator also from the Collingwood Public Library **

Both women were excellent speakers, and have given many workshops on fundraising from OLA, CLA to small public libraries ... their breakthrough fundraising initiatives have put Collingwood Public Library on the map.

This workshop was held in a condominium that they are currently raffling off in a major fundraising attempt. So far, ticket sales have exceeded their expectations, and it will probably turn out to be a successful venture for them.

They began their workshop by describing how and why they decided to get into fundraising. It all began in 1990. Kathy Frizell was originally hired for a one year contract position, but her abilities were so valuable, the library board decided to keep her on a permanent basis. At about the same time, Kerri Robinson began her post of CEO. When she started in this position, she could see that the library needed some help not only with the staff, but with better public relations. With both of them combining their ideas and skills, Collingwood Public Library has done excellent financially for a community of their size.

It all began with a logo. A local artist donated her time and skills towards that. From that stemmed items such as posters, internet directories, note pads, calendars, sweatshirts and T-shirts. They have planned such events as golf tournaments, dinner theatres, multicultural events, and even partnered with the city Recreation department to bring in the Tall ships.

Their logo was interesting. They decided that they just didn't want to market Collingwood

Public Library, but be able to expand their expertise to any public library.

The logo was simply a Carnegie Public Library, with "THE PUBLIC LIBRARY" imprinted on it, thus enabling them to market their fundraising ideas or fundraising package to any library in Canada and the U.S.

I enrolled in this workshop in the hopes of obtaining some good fundraising ideas for my First Nation libraries. I did get a few ideas from their smaller projects, but some of their larger fundraising events would not be possible for a First Nation reserve.

Tour of the Collingwood Public Library

It is always nice to see how other Public Libraries are set up, especially for a small community such as Collingwood. It is a fairly new building constructed after their Carnegie library was destroyed by arson a few years back. It is interesting to note how their library is set up, and I was particularly impressed with their children's area which is bright and nicely decorated to entice children.

I received many good handouts on their services and some extremely good ideas for programming which I plan to share with the First Nations libraries.

Internet and Libraries

This workshop was a good basic introduction to the world of the Internet. All three presenters were well informed and easy to understand. The session began by informing us of the equipment needed to access the internet. The list is as follows: 1) Computer 2) Modem 3) Programs 4) Telephone line 5) ISDN line 6) Service Provider. We compared Service Providers as to what to look for before choosing one.

The Internet offers such features as:
E-Mail, information, programs, entertainment, and various discussion groups. We also discussed the importance of bookmarks and how to use them. We then covered home pages and viewed an example of a good home page. (We looked at SOLS homepage) The World Wide Web was covered describing it as a

navigational tool enabling one to move through the Internet. The anatomy of the web page and the browser were also mentioned. Search engines such as Alta Vista, Inforseek and Open Text were discussed and a comparison was made between them.

Excellent handouts were offered, listing information such as an Internet glossary and Internet Bibliography.

Valerie Welsch's Conference Report:

Well, I have been a member of OALT/ABO for ten years and finally got to attend my first conference put on by another region. A Thunder Bay representative was needed for the Annual Business meeting, so I opted to attend. After the hour and a half flight to Toronto, I boarded the Simcoe County Airport Service van and rode for another hour and a half to the Cranberry Resort in Collingwood on Georgian Bay. The entire conference was held inside the resort except for the BBQ on Friday evening.

The workshop that I attended Friday afternoon was "CENTRAL 2000". Michele Dotterer, the regional sales manager for Information Access Company (IAC), was the presenter. IAC provides electronic document delivery of abstracts, full text, and full content to thousands of journals. Michele uses the Internet as a gateway to the IAC. If your library could afford the service, you could contact the Academic Index, Expanded Academic Index, Business & Company ProFile, Business Index, General Business File, Computer Database, F & S Index. Health Reference Centre, Legal Trac. National Newspaper, and PAIS International. Some of the abstracts are available through IAC before the journal is even published. The cost of a subscription was based on your book budget minus any A/V and reference allotment. The example Michele gave was a small library might have an annual book budget of \$50,000 and so a general reference database for one year would cost them \$10,000.

Michele gave everyone Telenet instruction so we could try the service for the month. If requested, we could try the databases through Netscape for

a week (after special passwords we established). I requested such a service and the Lakehead Board of Education's Teacher-Librarians' recently had a week to evaluate the service.

After this workshop, Donna Brown and I attended the BBQ. We won the prize for the best "regional theme" name tags. Special thanks must go to Heather Houston for our receipt of this honour.

On Saturday morning Donna and I attended the second workshop entitled "Internet and Libraries". This was presented by Jenny Amy, Oma Brett and Adele Service. Ironically, this was an interesting session on the Internet (even though we were minus the computer). The three ladies presented their practical learning experiences as they led us through Internet service providers, creating bookmarks, and organizing them under headers, evaluating Web pages, and using different search engines. I have since enjoyed trying Oma Brett's bookmarks handout. Here is one to try — Cyber Degwey.
