

Recently an article was published in the Post that contained some uneducated remarks concerning the qualifications and knowledge of library technicians. The following letter to the editor is in defense of our profession:

"Darts For Library Tech Column"

The Editor:

This in response to an article written by Susanne Marquardt in the May 29 Post — "Certified Teaching Librarians Lost". More specifically, I direct my response to two particular sentences; "Projections are that technicians or library facilitators will take over. These people will likely have little or no library training..."

I assume that the author, when using the word "technician" is referring to library technicians.

Lakehead University offers a two year diploma program in Library & Information Studies from which library technicians graduate. During those 2 years, students learn advanced library skills to prepare them for work in any type of library. Information retrieval deals with the computer skills of on-line searching, CD-ROM use, and accessing the Internet.

Courses such as reference, cataloguing, children's literature, records management, government documents, business and current issues teach students valuable library skills for the workplace. A course on media presentation includes the use of audio-visual equipment, graphics and desk top publishing.

All students are required to perform five weeks of practice work in many different libraries. Graduates are well prepared for the information and technological explosion of the 1990s.

Students and graduates of the program are entitled to hold membership in the Ontario Association of Library Technicians, a provincial organization, whose mandate is to maintain and advance the professional standards set out by our constitution.

LIBRARY TECH FINDS TREASURE

During my travels this summer I happened upon a treasure for library techs. "The World's Biggest Bookstore" on Edward Street in Toronto. Originally a bowling alley, the World's **Biggest Bookstore** contains every book you could ever desire or need in its 70,000 square feet. This enormous two-story bookstore which opened November 5th, 1980, is larger than two football fields, and features 27 kilometers of shelves, over one million books and over 143 thousand titles. They offer a 10% discount and



do not charge shipping fees to libraries. What a library tech paradise!!!

Being completely automated, the courteous staff can help you search by author, title or ISBN. The store itself is organized by subject and format. They ship books all over the world to places such as Japan and Australia.

I spoke with Marc Plume, an undergraduate and aspiring writer, who manned the front information desk. He told me that the World's **Biggest Bookstore** employs mostly university undergraduates and writers, but he didn't know if any library techs worked there. Too bad!

The most often subject areas requested were computers and business. Yet they sell equal quantities of fiction and non-fiction. Marc's two most unusual requests have been: 1) Who was the professor on Gilligan's Island? and 2) Do you have that little brown book which weighs approximately 3 pounds and costs about \$3 U.S.?




FROM THE HALLS OF LEARNING

OUR ROVING REPORTER ... "LIBRARIES DOWN UNDER"


On May 6, 1996, I set out for the land of OZ. My husband and I spent two months touring the wonderful country of Australia. Among our tours was the Sydney Opera House Library. It is situated on the western boardwalk of the harbour and it contains books, scores, magazines, photographs and other reference materials relating to the Opera House itself and the performing arts. It was fantastic, a must to see.

The New South Wales State Library was even better (my husband even thought so). We both thoroughly enjoyed our day at the State Library. This Library did a great job combining the old with the new. It has a modern facility, which was completed in 1988. It is in this part of the

building you can find the open stacks, the reference collection, the Friends of the Library. the administration offices, a coffee as well as a gift shop. The older building, built approximately in the early 1900s is better known as the Mitchell and Dixion Library. Here is where you will find the rare and special book collection along with the Shakespeare Room. This room was built to house the Library's Shakespeare collection. The style of the room and the materials used, recreated the feeling of the Tudor period for me and my husband.

I would have to say that my favorite part of the library was the content of their display cases. In particular, the personal log of the English Captain to the Bounty, Captain Bligh. This was a part of history that Australia adopted as their own. It was a great time to feel and see what libraries are like on the other side of the world.
