## **Provincial Report**



The OALT/ABO Board of Directors and Executive meeting was held at 10 a.m. Saturday, September 19, 1998 at the North York Civic Centre.

A major concern to OALT/ABO is the closing of Library and Information Technician programs at various colleges. Fanshaw College only has 15 students enrolled in its course. Georgian College is not accepting new students and Sheridan College will be closing its Library and Information Technicians program in 2000.

The colleges have cited declining enrollment as the major reason for this decision. Also many students are unable to find employment in the library field upon graduation and often enroll in other programs to augment their skills and knowledge. This has prompted some colleges, such as Sheridan, to develop other programs. Sheridan stated that the closure of its Library and Information Technicians program was the first step in the transformation process. In the future

Sheridan will develop new postgraduate programming that will broaden the scope of the information field.

Nanci Abbondanza, OALT/ABO President, will meet with Marion Wilburn, coordinator of Sheridan's LIT program to discuss the closure and its implications.

As Associations continue to experience declining memberships, some have decided to get together and discuss this extremely important issue. OLA has invited [Pg#]Nanci Abbondanza and Pam Casey, Vice President, of OALT/ABO to attend a Strategic Planning Workshop October 2-4 to give an OALT perspective on this topic.

Perspectives '99 will take place May 13-16, 1999, in Sudbury. The conference and accommodations will be at the Sheraton Four Points Hotel, Further details will follow. OALT/ABO encourages all members to try and attend. This is an excellent opportunity to meet your peers and exchange ideas and information.



## Tour of Chancellor Paterson Library

On September 15 after the general meeting, the OALT/ABO members went on a tour of the newly renovated Chancellor PatersonLibrary, Lakehead University, with Gisella Scalese, Orientation / Continuing Education Librarian. Previously, the library was tired-looking with cramped facilities, dingy-coloured walls, and worn furniture; the three architects that worked on it were faced with the restraining factor that the building could not be built upwards or outwards so the only option was to renovate the existing structure. Funding for the renovations had been provided during the provincial New Democratic Party government; the funding ceased when the Progressive Conservatives came into power but it has since resumed.

The Library has been renovated over a period of a three stage plan with Stage 1 being devoted to basement and fifth floor, Stage 2 to third and fourth floors and Stage 3 to the main and second floors. All renovations were done during university breaks (e.g. summer, Christmas, spring break) so there would be as few interruptions as possible. The number of materials that had to be moved was astonishing; for example, at one point 300.000 books from the third floor were moved to the ground floor to make way for wiring. carpeting and paint renovations.

As soon as we walked in, we could see the massive renovations and changes that have occurred in this building. New carpeting of muted grey and burgundy was under our feet and new light grey paint was on the walls. Furniture was pulled away from the existing banks of windows to allow the entry of natural light. Long rows of computers designated as L.U.'s online access machines are to the left of the reference desk which is the first access point that a person sees when entering the building and looking directly ahead. Right above this is a suspended ceiling which forms the shape of a dome. It gives the feeling of walking into a great centre of learning - what else is a university library? Recessed fixtures provide the lighting. Directly to the left of the entry is the circulation desk where people can take out books. This area also contains reserved materials that professors put aside for their students to use. On the main floor, beautifully paneled support pillars hide wiring for designated workstations such as Internet Access, Electronic Indexes, Firstsearch Chem/stn database and printing, multi-purpose machines and electronic sources at stand-alone machines. There are six large tables for students to use plus numerous carrels. The study carrels on the perimeter of each floor are wired for access to the Lakehead University Campus network. Electronic

Services (people can inquire about the Internet, Cd-ROMS and other electronic databases) and Interlibrary Loans Services are currently located in a side room where Government Documents were located - these are now housed next to the Reference section. There are also a number of offices in this room. In the north-west corner are electronic readers with microfiche, micro cards, microforms and microfilm storage areas nearby. Prior to the renovation, the Reference Collection was weeded of older, less used texts; these books have found a home in the storage area in the basement. The Reference Collection is housed in stacks that are staggered in height; this provides an area where students can rest books and read.

The second floor houses the photocopiers (both coin-operated and copycard activated) and the periodicals, both current and back issues. The old Copy Services room is currently being renovated as the Current Issue room where the newest issue of each periodical is kept. The ideas are to facilitate browsing and also keep the year's issues in order (less shuffling). Comfortable chairs and tables are in this room. In the main part of the floor are shelves filled with bound issues of periodical back issues. Each periodical title is issued its own Library of Congress number, and this number is assigned to the spine label of the bound collection. Back volumes of the current year's issue are separated from the back issues by a divider stating "Current Magazines". As on the main floor wired carrels along the perimeter and tables in different locations are provided.

The third and fourth floors are designated as the locations for the main collection: A-L on the third and M-Z on the fourth. These floors also have wired carrels, and the fourth floor has rooms along the south wall that can be reserved for the study groups of up to six people.

The remaining two floors were not on the tour: the basement and the fifth floor. The basement houses the library's storage area and an area for classrooms and offices of the Library and Information Studies program; the fifth floor house the Northern Studies collection and other offices.

The tour itself took about thirty minutes. Various comments of approval were heard amid the OALT/ABO members who were pleasantly surprised by all of the changes in the renovated building. Many thanks to Gisella Scalese for showing us around the renovated facility. With the renovations to the Library, it has become a place that is much more inviting for patrons to spend some time, and I fully intend to do so.

Also, ask people to fill out cards on how they would like to be notified of upcoming meetings.
