Provincial Report



The OALT/ABO Board of Directors and Executive met at the North York Memorial Hall on November 20th 1999.

The Public Relations committee has decided to survey a percentage of OALT/ABO membership (approximately 10%) to gain knowledge and to improve public relations. professional development, and regional / conference attendance. The committee will survey - new members, long time members, lapsed members, and non members. The questions to be asked are being formulated now and will be ready for approval at the next OALT/ABO Board of Directors and Executive meeting in February. Linda Bukovy is our representative on this committee. Once the surveys are completed, and the information compiled it will give the association a solid foundation to focus on in the next 2 years. Recruitment of lapsed and new members can begin. Possible volunteers for regional and provincial positions could be discovered, as well as newsletter articles, and workshops that would be of interest to members.

Ten Sudbury Regional branch members met on January 30th 1998 and set forth a proposal which was presented to the Board of Directors and Executive on February 21st 1998, in which Linda Davis would act as convener and principal organizer of the 1999 conference. She was to be paid a fee from the profits, if any (amount to be determined but likely in the vicinity of \$2000.00 + 10%). The net profit will be divided between SRB and the provincial body as per the usual formula. This proposal was passed at the February 21st 1998 directors and executive meeting. Linda has presented a financial statement from the conference showing a balance of \$664.20. This amount will be used to cover Linda's expenses in organizing the conference. Therefore, there are no profits to be split between the hosting region and the province this year. Linda has provided several comments that I will present at our next general meeting and again in the NEWSletter/NOUVelles. Since we have asked to host the 2002 conference, we should seriously consider her ponderings.

Still on the theme of conferences, Danielle Arnat, Ottawa's conference coordinator for "Turning the Page" invited the provincial executive to be a corporate sponsor of their conference for a reduced rate of \$400.00. This invitation was turned down. A draft of their press release was presented for discussion... and much discussion followed. Just as I require help when writing in french, Danielle requires some assistance when writing in English. Nanci Abbondanza, provincial president, is to reply to Danielle. It really would be fantastic to see all Danielle's grandiose plans come to fruition. For \$800.00, you can stay in a heritage inn (no further expenses), arrive Wednesday, enjoy tours on Thursday, workshops on Friday and Saturday, and fly home on Sunday. Danielle is still trying to arrange tea with the Governor General!

The Internet Task Force is still looking into changing our domain name from http://www.interlog.com/~oaltabo to oalt/abo.on.ca. Vice-president, Pam Casey has also been working on acquiring a central phone and fax. Diane Baksa, president of Halton-Peel, and Inco Library Technologist has been granted the right to a phone (905-403-2561) and a fax (905-403-2453) for the association to use. Diane will be checking the voice mailbox daily and messages will be forwarded to the appropriate person. There is a contingency plan for when Diane is away.



WEB SEARCHING TIPS

- 1. Caps search engines seek only matches with the same capital pattern. For example, type Stones when searching for information on Mick Jagger rather than stones, which may lead you sites on rocks.
- 2. Phrase searching if you are searching for a specific phrase, it is beneficial to enclose the phrase in quotations. This will restrict the search to documents containing all words in that specific order.
- 3. Abbreviate for broader searches. If you are searching for information on wrestling, you could use it as your keyword but, if you want all related information, try using wrestl*.
- 4. Stop words can work if used wisely. If, for example, you want information on both Charlie Chaplin & silent movies, key in your search as Chaplin AND silent movies. If you want information on either of your key words, key in Chaplin OR silent movies. If your goal is biographical information on Chaplin and do not want information on silent movies, try "Charlie Chaplin"AND NOT silent movies.
- 5. Plus and Minus keying in a + or between words works the same way as keywords AND or NOT in adding or omitting phrase.
