### **Director's Report**



For those members who were not able to attend the General Meeting on 7 December 1999 and join in the discussion of Huronia's proposal here it is.

### PROPOSAL RE: OALT/ABO STRUCTURE

#### **Current structure of OALT/ABO**

Provincial executive and board of directors 5 elected / 3 appointed executive Director from each of 7 regions Autonomous regions Regional executive (typically 5 elected, 1 or 2 appointed)
Director to provincial board

#### Problems with current structure

Widespread regions

Travel expenses or teleconference expenses for 4 provincial meetings per year

Travel expenses for regional meetings (usually 4 per vear)

Mailing of membership fees/cards back and forth between regions and provincial

Mailing of regional newsletters and provincial

newsletters
Internal problems for both far-flung and close regions

Cost of travel to meetings/workshops prohibitive
Time to travel for same prohibitive

Larger (number-wise) regions appear to have many paper only members

Looks good on resume?

No apparent interest in networking and workshops No apparent interest in promoting organization Small number of members, yet large number of library types

Wide variety of interest in relatively small group Difficult to plan workshops for such wide appeal

#### Proposed new structure

Make-up of provincial governing body
Elected regional/district representatives (appendix !)
OR

Elected interest group representatives (appendix II) Paid part-time executive director, paid part-time membership coordinator (retirees?) Or one full-time to cover both, or any other workable combination. Duties would include correspondence and newsletter publication.

Elected executive to include president, vicepresident, treasurer.

Meetings of governing body

Annual meeting to coincide with annual conference Contacts between representatives, executive and paid staff via fax, email, etc.

Mail-in or proxy voting for representatives

### Benefits of proposed system

Cost effective

Membership fees directly to provincial organization One newsletter, not one per region and one provincial Provincial funds available for interest group workshops

Consistency with other professional and library organizations as becomes a provincial organization with regional/interest affiliations, not regional organization with provincial affiliations

Promotes interest groups based on type of library for improved networking

Less paper heavy with more streamlined membership procedure and fewer newsletters, minutes, etc.
Natural evolution for the organization after 25 years

of existence Web page updated at regular intervals by paid executive

Centralized office, central telephone and fax lines,

central mailing address

Other organizational models exist so no need to reinvent the wheel

Opportunity to piggy-back conference with other large organizations if desired

Easier to implement yearly membership renewable every 12 months rather than fixed dates as now Easier to implement membership with no cards mailed out, just a receipt and database of members Answer to proposed merger with OLA as would become a cost-effective, more efficient organization More efficient dissemination of information as no longer need to rely on directors to disseminate

Current regional funds could/should be donated to new provincial organization to fund newsletters, workshops, conferences, paid staff, etc. Not an unreasonable suggestion since most of accumulated funds came from conference profits, thus technically belongs to members at large.

Reluctance of regions to "disband"

More interest group interaction should appeal to many

"Social" get together still an option for those who wish Time frame for implementation should be set out by a representative, province-wide group agreeing on a time-line.

# HOW TO SPOT A COMPUTER VIRUS HOAX



Are your tired of receiving e-mail messages warning of deadly computer viruses? Experts say there are a number of signs that a virus alert is a hoax.

- •No Web link. Typically, a hoax will claim that a company such as IBM or Microsoft has made an announcement about a devastating new virus. A real alert will contain a link to a fixed Web page of the company explaining the problem.
- •Poor grammar. A virus announcement should come from the desk of a well-educated company official but they often contain misspellings and grammatical errors typical of the young people who usually create and release the hoaxes.
- •Hysteria. All hoaxes contain an urgent request for the recipients to send a copy to everyone they know. They also tend to use adjectives such as "deadly" to describe the virus.

### TO AVOID VIRUSES

Never open anything INCLUDED, LINKED OR ATTACHED to an email from someone you don't know. This is only really a problem for users of Microsoft mail programs like Office, Outlook, and Exchange, but it's a good habit for everyone. It IS possible to download a dangerous executable program through e-mail, or through your web browser. For heaven's sake DON'T RUN A PROGRAM FROM A SOURCE YOU DON'T HAVE VERY GOOD REASON TO TRUST! If your browser or e-mail reader does not ask you permission before it runs a downloaded program, THROW THAT BROWSER OR READER AWAY! It's no more useful than a door to your house that can't keep anyone out. IS directors, get a clue and demand that macro and Visual Basic "functionality" be removed from Microsoft mail products!
