Conference 2003 - OALT/ABO's 30th Annual Conference submitted by Valerie Welsch

It was a perfect week-end for a conference as it was pouring rain so everyone stayed inside and attended workshops and the Annual Business Meeting. I missed the first two days because of a long awaited root canal appointment and arrived Friday evening. Also in attendance from Thunder Bay was Wanda Ewachow.

Saturday morning I attended Vicki Whitmell's presentation on Changes in Libraries, Associations and Careers. Vicki discussed the continued role of library associations and how they, like libraries, must change and adapt to meet the needs of the future. Her PowerPoint presentation is a PDF on our website (www.oaltabo.on.ca) as are most of the workshops. This was a good lead-in to my next workshop OALT/ABO's Constitutional Reform - the Time for Change is Now! Nanci and Tracy stated that there were three big changes in the proposed OALT/ABO constitution. One is the voting - power to the members, two is the chapters which can be geographic, interest groups, or otherwise, and thirdly the Directors are replaced with an executive with the power to vote. They foresee the benefits as long term stability and equitable governance. There were lots of questions during this session and the Friday session. Many of these questions were out of their constitutional reform mandate as they related to the Board of Director's Policies and Duties of OALT/ABO Administrators.

The Annual Business meeting was scheduled with anticipation, a constitutional reform confrontation. The ABM progressed smoothly through the usual reports and then into unfinished business. The recommendations from the constitutional reform committee passed without comment. The lesson I learned from this was, the two constitutional reform workshops before hand so everyone had the opportunity to air their views and receive explanations, allowed the ABM to proceed efficiently. The new executive attended their first brainstorming meeting which followed the ABM. The new executive is listed on the website.

The banquet was followed by a very entertaining DJ complete with props.

Next year's conference will be hosted by Lohania.

Hurray For "Kid Lit" by Linda Bukovy

In her article "It's official : CanLit for kids comes of age" (The Globe and Mail, Saturday, April 26, 2003, p. D13), Susan Perren announces that A Guide to Canadian Children's Books by Deirdre Baker and Ken Setterington (McClelland and Stewart, 296 p., \$34.99) has come out at a wonderful time, since Canadian children's literature authors are becoming well-known (think Marie-Louise Gay and Tim-Wynne-Jones, Martha Brooks and Robert Munsch). Baker teaches children's literature at the University of Toronto and is the Toronto Star's children's book columnist, and Setterington, who has worked as a librarian, was the Toronto Public Library's first Children and Youth Advocate, and a CBC children's book panel member. Both are authors of children's books.

According to this article, the book has over 500 recommended books that are divided into age and genre brackets. They cover the gamut from "board books ... concept books, picture books, traditional tales, poetry and rhyming stories, books for beginning readers, novels for the 7 to 12 age group, short-story collections and anthologies for the same age group, series books, novels for 12 and up, shortstory collections for 12 and up and non-fiction".

Following are appendices that "include a list of highly recommended books for all age groups and from all genres; a title index; an author/illustrator/editor index; a subject index; settings in Canada; and last of all, the home base of each author/illustrator/editor."



And the Winners Are...

The Blue Spruce Award is an Ontario reading

program for kindergarten to Grade 3 students which focuses on the best picture book. The Ontario School Library Association sponsors this award. In this program, students read ten nominated Canadian picture books and then vote for their favourite book. After voting, results come from throughout the entire province and are tabulated, the best picture book is then selected and its author/illustrator is/are honoured with the Blue Spruce Award.

The Official Selections have been compiled from a list of about 20 Canadian picture books that were published in the year 2002, then narrowed down to ten for the 2003 Blue Spruce reading program.

writing in 1971, and her first children's book Crisis on Conshelf Ten was published in 1975. Since that first book, she had written more than 35 books in genres such as adventure, historical fiction, science fiction, fantasy and short stories. Children are drawn to her books since her writing involved issues that they could relate to and find important. Some titles are Log Jam, Castle Tourmandyne, The Crystal Drop, Devil on My Back, the Isis trilogy (The Isis Pedlar, The Guardian of Isis, and The Keeper of the Isis Light) and The Maze (which has been shortlisted for the 2003 OLA White Pine Award) Monica Hughes was the recipient of the Phoenix Award, Canada Council's Children Literature Prize (now known as the Governor General's Award) twice. Certificate of Honour from the International Board on Books for Young People, the Queen's Golden Jubilee medal, and the Order of Canada (awarded in 2002).

Monica Hughes - dead at 77 written by Linda Bukovy

On March 7, 2003, Canada lost one of its foremost children's literature writers in the form of Monica Hughes who died of a stroke in Edmonton, Alberta. She was 77. She is survived by her husband Glenn Hughes and four children.

She was born on November 3, 1925, in Liverpool, England, and served as a Wren (Women's Royal Naval Service) during WWII. She immigrated to Canada in 1952, met and married Glen Hughes, and in 1964 they moved to Edmonton. She began

Let me introduce you to a woman of our ilk. She's methodical, she's precise, she's observant, and she's able to locate information at the drop of her Dewey. She's Miss Wilhelmina Zukas, a librarian/sleuth who lives in the picturesque fictional town of Bellehaven, Washington. Helma (any other nickname is not acceptable to her) works at the Bellehaven Public Library where she copes with staff's foibles and patrons' concerns, often finding herself dragged into situations where things just don't look right... like murder scenes. She's the creation of Jo Dereske, a mystery writer, who,

according to a website, "pokes fun at the stereotype of repressed, methodical librarians".
