MARCH MEETING

At the March meeting Alison Roberts, co-ordinator of the affirmative action Consulting Service, Women's Bureau of the Ministry of Labor spoke on affirmative action implementation in the private sector.

40% of Ontario women are in the workforce. 56% of the women of Toronto work out of the home, as well as in it. The wage gap between men and women isn't getting smaller, men make 10\$ for every 8\$ women make. 2/3's of women are in sales, clerical positions and in the service areas (nursing, teaching). Myths about the working woman, that women work for different reasons than men, are not true. Many men still believe that women work for fun, for pin money, and they <u>all</u> have husbands supporting them--women work for the same reasons as men, to make money. Women are happy doing what their doing, locked into low level, low paying jobs--myth, women will leave a boring job faster than a man will and 1/2 to 2/3's of women in the workforce are interested in upgrading their working skills. Women aren't qualified--myth, on the whole, women are better education than men.

Women have been taught to set low goals for themselves, but women work for at least 25 years of their lives. Women will always have two jobs, home and a paying job. It's said women are suitable for nurturing jobs and unsuitable for high pressure jobs: In 1975 Affirmative Action was set into action, it is for the employers designed to offer equal opportunity to women.

The most important thing to remember about Affirmative Action is that it is not reverse discrimination, but a long overdue correction.

Last year I was fortunate enough to visit Hawaii, and could not resist the opportunity to visit the State Library in Honolulu.

Honolulu Library and Reading Room Association was formed in 1879 to "provide a reading room for mechanics where they could spend an evening enjoyably away from the allurements of the saloons" !!

The Library of Hawaii opened in 1913, with an initial collection of 30,000 books, 18,878 from the Honolulu Reading Room Association, and 1,325 from the Hawaii Historical Society. The collection numbered 1,541.849 in 1974.

The Hawaii State Library System is under the Department of Education, and there are now 43 public libraries spread throughout the Islands, including a Library for the Blind and Physically Handicapped, and 33 community and community school libraries, with others planned or under construction.

Eight bookmobiles serve rural areas. Back in 1930 when that service began, these were called "book cars".

The State Library's special collection of almost 350,000 items includes a large selection of books and magazines with newspapers and material in Japanese, Chinese, French, Korean, German, Filipino and other languages.

The Hawaii and Pacific Room offers 21,000 State documents and nearly 50,000 Hawaiiana and Pacifica titles.

There are microfilm readers backed by a collection of 9,389 reels of microfilm. They have 15,849 phonograph records, 2,000 sound films, filmstrips and cassettes in a wide range of subjects.

In 1927 the Library of Hawaii was transformed into a quadrangle surrounding a picturesque open-air garden court. It has lots of flowering shrubs, and chairs where patrons can sit in the sun or shade and read. The library occupies two floors, and there is a large tree in the middle of the garden court, it can be seen sticking through the roof of the building from the street.

In the children's section the walls are decorated with murals of Hawaiian legends, painted by Juliette May Fraser, a wonderful setting for children.

The only air-conditioned room in the library is the Hawaii and Pacific, this is necessary for the preservation of documents used for research, reference and historical purposes.

The staff were very helpful and I came away with a fistful of handouts, from the history of the library to a list of library locations and hours throughout the Islands.

Library hours vary, but Tuesday and Thursday are late nights, closing at 8 pm. Friday and Saturday hours are 9 - 5 pm.

No library cards are required! Only a valid identification. No fee for tourists, no overdues except for films and records.

There are courses in Library Technology at the Leeward Campus of the Community

College. Two programs are offered, a certificate of achievement (30 units) and an Associate in Science Degree (60 units).

The former prepares the student for entry-level employment in a position such as a library assistant.

The Associate degree program covers a more advanced level of training for work as a library technician.

Both courses have a basic mathematics I and II (4 units) as a requirement, but the rest of the courses are similar to ours in Ontario.

Unfortunately I did not have time to go to the campus, I am sure that it would have been interesting to compare notes - well maybe next time!


