TALTA Members Working for You

The following is an autobiography by Peta Shelton / Placement:

Although I was completely inexperienced in association matters, I came to TALTA in 1977 as an enthusiastic beginner - holding the president's office for one two year term and then chaired the conference committee for Dimensions 1979.

These days my role is relatively passive, but most interesting as I see the positions that come available and then have the satisfaction of helping to fill these jobs with TALTA members.

My work experience has included the establishment of a business and systems library for Honeywell Ltd., a six month stint with the editorial department's library at the Northern Miner and 8 years (!) with Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce, Information Centre.

Thankyou Sue Medhurst for representing TALTA at past meetings of TALG. A volunteer is needed to take her place. The next meeting is not until April 1983. Meetings are held during weekday afternoons for half a day at the Univ. of Toronto, Faculty of Library & Information Science. Sue described TALG for us.

The Toronto Area Librarians' Group has been meeting since the fall of 1980 on a twice yearly basis. This group is composed of representatives from Toronto based library associations, e.g., TALTA (the Toronto area branch of OALT/ABO), the Toronto chapters of OLA, SLA, CASLIS; schools e.g., Seneca, Ryerson, University of Toronto's Faculty of Library & Information Science; and library related groups e.g., Sheridan Park Association's Library and Information Science Committee. The group was called into being by members of the Faculty of Library Science Alumni Association who felt it was desirable to have informal get-togethers at which information such as meeting schedules and topics, publications, and matters of mutual concern (credentialism, continuing education credit units, etc.) could be shared and discussed. This group has proven to be a good contact for TALTA.

The survey was compiled from three surveys - British Columbia Association of Library Technicians, Manitoba Association of Library Technicians and the Special Libraries Association - with our own modifications. Regarding all of the surveys used, they are all set out in the same manner - they all look like one another. Comments about the Committee copying the SLA survey are therefore unjustified.

We would like to have come up with more comparative tables, but as we do not have access to a computer, we had to tabulate the responses manually.

All comments regarding additions or changes to the survey will be added to the minutes for the use of the next Salary Survey Committee.

The Committee would like to thank the 73% of the members who returned completed surveys. The response rate was very encouraging; it demonstrates that we have a committed membership who want action.
