Statistics From Seneca College

Provided by Frances Davidson-Arnott, Library Technique Program Director, Seneca College

In 1989, Seneca College graduated 38 technicians. The average salary in 1989 for graduates employed in all types of libraries was \$24 044. Graduates in government libraries earned on average \$25 241, special libraries \$ 24 356, and public libraries \$ 24 318.

A wealth of job opportunities are advertised by employers through Seneca's Placement Office and on the Library Techniques Job Board. Not all jobs were filled by graduates. In 1988/89 a total of 218 jobs were advertised. The majority of employers were Special libraries (131 postings) and Public libraries (36 postings).

Employment Law & You

TALTA, in conjunction with Halton/Peel region, hosted a very valuable summer meeting on Saturday August 11 at the Old Mill. The knowledge and experience of the practising lawyers who spoke to us on the topic of legal issues in employment was appreciated by all who attended.

Alison Hudgins started the morning seminar with an overview of legislation affecting workers at the workplace. She cited the issues the laws were meant to address and spoke about the implication on previous decisions. The techs in attendance were particularly interested in having concerns about pay equity addressed.

Barry Fisher continued the morning session with a talk on unlawful dismissal. Shooting straight from the hip Barry gave hard facts about what is at the heart of unlawful dismissal suits. He spoke about personality conflicts, charges of incompetence, illegal lay offs, bankruptcy and the difference in union vs. nonunion dismissal suits. Barry was frank about the legal process—the costs, the time and the possible outcome of court action. He was able to give useful advice regarding difficult relationships. In addition to this, Barry was a lively and amusing speaker who entertained questions throughout his talk.

Summer Tour Boys and Girls House, Toronto

An excellent tour, by a staff of experts.

Lorna Toolis, an avid sci-fifan spoke about the non-circulating collection of science fiction and fantasy materials. We learned something of the origins and development of the genre, the divisions within the genre, the growing number of authors, the impact of television and film successes such as Star Trek and Star Wars on science fiction publishing and the emergence of a vocal and visible following of fans. The growing respectability of this genre of fiction will soon be reflected in the renaming of this particular collection. In January 1991 the "Spaced-Out Library" will become the "Merril Collection of Science Fiction, Speculation and Fantasy".

Jill Shefrin's knowledge extended beyond the origin and content of the Osborne Collection of children's books to the general history and development of children's books. The Osborne Collection is a reference collection of books of outstanding literary or illustrative merit in its time or now. The books in the collection date back to the 14th century and are in various formats on various themes reflecting social conditions and attitudes of the times. Discussions on the history of children's books included the origins of public library services for children in North America.

Joanne Shot is the children's librarian at Boys and Girls House. Herknowledge of the circulating collection of children's books is complimented by her knowledge of the users. Joanne gave us examples of questions she's been asked, censorship issues that have arisen and special collections such as the Bagshaw Collection of puppetry and plays, that have developed over the years. Altogether the tour of the collections at Boys and Girls house was an enriching experience.

From Statistics Canada The 1991 Census Questionnaire – What's It All About?

The Census is Coming

On June 4, 1991, the Census of Population and Census of Agriculture will be conducted by Statistics Canada. Census questionnaires will be delivered to every household late in May, 1991. If one member from every Canadian household completes and mails back to Statistics Canada the Census questionnaire on June 4, 1991, the day will become a reference point for the demographic situation of Canadian households. As in previous census, there will be two questionnaires. The 2A questionnaire (the "short form") will survey 100% of the population and will include 9 basic questions. The 2B questionnaire (the "long form") will be distributed to 20% of the population and will contain approximately 50 questions.

Development of the Questionnaire

Research for the 1991 Census content began in 1987 with extensive consultations between Statistics Canada and users of census data in order to develop a sound understanding of user's needs before the information products are developed. As part of this research, an assessment was made of the importance of each product to various markets and target groups, including libraries and the general public.

After the consultation process, came context and questionnaire development. Decisions were made about questionnaire design after extensive testing of the design models to ensure that the questions would elicit the required information. The proposed wording of questions, is then submitted to the Federal Cabinet for approval following a recommendation from the Minister Responsible for Statistics Canada. After approval is achieved, the questionnaires are gazetted. Once the content is approved, the layouts of the questionnaires are designed.

Census Questions

The questions must meet legal data requirements of a census. They must also respond to the changing data needs of users and reflect the changing circumstances of Canadian lifestyles. Each census questionnaire is part of this evolutionary process. Some questions become redundant or lose their utility while new questions are required to keep up with social and technological changes.

Questions that will not be included on the 1991 Census are; number of usual residents per household; the type of heating equipment; and, the fuel type used for cooking and heating. A separate question of Aboriginal status was moved from the 2A questionnaire and will be collected on the 2B questionnaire instead.

Questions added to the 1991 Census deal with common-law status; fertility; religion; landed immigrant status; school attendance; and, condominium fees.

Confidentiality

It is important to understand that certain questions provide answers that are not used in the compilation of Census data but are used as a check of coverage and reporting activity. For example, names, addresses and phone numbers are not fed into the census computer data base. The imputed data is limited to information that cannot be linked to an individual household so as to maintain strict confidentiality of information. Confidentiality is our guarantee!
