## Special and Public Libraries Panel Discussion

TALTA's first meeting of the year was on Wednesday September 25 at Metro Toronto Reference Library. An exciting panel discussed career opportunities in special and public libraries.

Mary Dickerson, is the Deputy Executive Director and Director of Information and Reference Services at the Ontario Legislative Library. The Legislative Library is the largest special library in the Toronto area. It serves the needs of Ontario MPPs and other provincial government ministries. It is a full depository for provincial and Federal government publications. Special services provided include a Press Clipping Service and Research Services. The Press Clipping Service is responsible for the daily production of Toronto Press Today. Research Services produces the Ontario Government Publications Monthly Checklist and the Ontario Government Publications Annual Catalogue.

It is a high stress environment with a demanding client group. There are twenty-seven library technicians involved in all aspects of library work. Technicians also hold many supervisory positions. Mary Dickerson says that when hiring technicians, she looks for individuals with good communication skills. Given the timeliness of material, staff must be flexible and service-oriented. They must be challenged and be able to work in a structured environment.

Janice Hayes, Director of Client Services for the Canadian National Institute for the Blind spoke about their unique collection. The CNIB serves the needs of over 17,000 visually impaired individuals across Canada. Their collection consists primarily of talking books and Braille books. Talking books are unabridged recordings of printed material. Braille is a series of six raised dots representing letters of the alphabet. Over 850,000 items were circulated to users in 1990.

The CNIB Transcription Service transcribes books into Braille. It is a major supplier of talking books to public libraries across Canada and provides a training centre for volunteer Braillists. They also transcribe online searches into Braille.

The Sherman Swift Reference Library is a print collection primarily on rehabilitation. It serves the needs of CNIB staff, volunteers and students.

The CNIB hires technicians for all of its departments. Technicians hold supervisory positions in both the Transcription and Cataloguing/Processing Department. A number of Readers Advisory positions are also held by technicians. When hiring library technicians, Janice Hayes looks for individuals with good computer skills. Communication skills are also essential in order to meet the needs of their clientele. Several new positions will be opening up over the next few months in the Sherman Swift Library.

Arlene Chan, Head of the Travelling Branch for Toronto Public Library, spoke to the group about TPL. Toronto Public Library is the largest in Canada with over 916 staff. In addition to 32 branches, TPL operates a bookmobile; 60 deposit collections in hospitals, nursing homes and senior's residences; Library-on-Wheels; and a Travelling Branch. It also houses two world famous collections—the Osborne Collection of Early Children's Books and the Merrill Collection of Science Fiction, Speculation and Fantasy. Six newbranches are in the planning stage.

The past year brought many changes to TPL. The library system has been switched from GEAC to Dynix, and by late Fall their branches will be fully automated. Also, a five-year plan was introduced in April. The Plan addresses forecasted trends for Toronto and TPL's responses. These trends include; an influx of immigrants, fewer children, a population explosion back to the city, and a focus on older adults.

Elizabeth Metcalfe, Employment Officer, spoke about Toronto Public Library's hiring practices. According to union agreements, all positions must be first posted internally. Since the majority of positions are filled internally, the best way into TPL is through part-time work or casual 'emergency' work. Positions are often advertised with equivalencies and entry level jobs require a high school diploma. A typical entry level position is that of a Branch Assistant, A Branch Assistant performs circulation duties, and may answer some general reference questions. Elizabeth emphasized that staff must work at least two years in an entry level position before "moving up". She was very frank about the fact that TPL does not hire many library technicians. Like most other public libraries in Metropolitan Toronto, technician's skills are utilized primarily in Technical Services. At TPL Technical Services is centralized and there are currently seven fully accredited technicians working there. Elizabeth feels that Technical Services offers more scope for technicians than other departments.

During the past year, TPL has suffered from severe budget constraints. As a result, there have been delays in posting and filling positions.

A lively question period followed the panel talk. Speakers offered insight into what they look for on resumes and cover letters. They all agreed that whether they work in special or public libraries, technicians are faced with many challenging opportunities.

## The Executive Committee Response to the Ad-Hoc Committee on Programming Final Report

At our ABM in March, an Ad-Hoc Committee on Programming was formed. Their goal was to investigate our low meeting turnouts and to propose solutions.

The TALTA Executive would like to thank the Committee members—Brady Leyser (Chairperson), Margaret Bryan, Sue Callaway, Brenda Holtz, Lynn Norval, and Jacqueline Peacock for their hard work over the summer.

The Ad-Hoc Committee held an Open Forum meeting and conducted a telephone survey. The data collected from this survey was collated into a final report and presented to the TALTA Executive.

This survey shows that of the 58 random members contacted, most are interested in attending workshops. A number of workshop ideas were presented. The Executive is listening to the members and offering programs this year based on their replies. In September there was a panel discussion on employment in different types of libraries. In November, a Saturday morning workshop on Wordperfect 5.1 was offered. In late January or early February an evening workshop is planned on marketing yourself. These are all ideas that were generated from the survey.

The Final Report revealed to the Executive Committee that more investigation is needed. The Executive Committee will be putting together an extensive survey, which will be distributed in the March newsletter. This survey will allow all TALTA members to respond. We ask that you take the time to read the survey, think about your answers, and complete it fully. The newly formed In Touch Committee will be contacting TALTA members by telephone to get their responses in on time.

Again, thank you to the Ad-Hoc Committee. The Executive Committee appreciates all that you have done, and we feel it is a good beginning for future investigation.

## Guide to Managing Statistics Canada Publications in Libraries Catalog #11-208E, \$75

This new guide provides libraries with advice on building a reference collection of Statistics Canada publications in order to have at least 10 years of the most recently revised data. The guide features a comprehensive listing of all catalogued publications released since 1917, by Statistics Canada publication number. In addition to suggested retention policy, the entries provide links between current and discontinued publications and other useful reference notes. The guide replaces the uncatalogued "Retention Guides for Statistics Canada Publications in Libraries" and will be updated annually.

#### Adult Literacy in Canada Catalog #89-S25, \$85

<u>Adult Literacy in Canada</u>, provides you with the most current and complete information on the state of Canadian literacy. You'll discover many eye-opening facts. For example:

While 62% of Canadians can meet everyday reading needs, 2.9 million adults cannot deal with most everyday written material because of inadequate reading skills.

Reading skills are highest in Western Canada.
