OALT/ABO SALARY SURVEY

SUMMARY

The information produced by the survey is used by Library Technicians and employers in salary negotiations, and as a guideline when setting salaries for new positions. The 1991 province-wide results have been compared with both the 1990 provincial results and the 1992 regional results in order to provide some interesting comparisons. All information is stated in percentage of the total number of responses indicating that they were employed.

TYPE OF LIBRARY

Results of the survey were notably effected by what part of the province the region was situated. TALTA (Toronto area) and Halton-Peel had a greater number of persons working in Speciality Libraries where areas like Ottawa, found the majority of members working in government libraries and Huronia found their members working in public libraries.

STAFF SIZE

It's a near tie in the size of libraries most respondents work in; 36% are in small (2-5 persons) and 33% are in very large (10+) libraries. TALTA members were found to be working in both sizes of libraries including several one person libraries.

EDUCATION AND RESPONSIBILITIES

35% of the respondents were found to have some other degree in addition to the basic Library Technician degree.

Library Technicians have many tasks to perform in their jobs! Reference and Circulations remain the top two functions with Acquisitions, Cataloguing and Serials following close behind.

SALARY NEGOTIATIONS AND EMPLOYMENT

Library Technicians have little to say over their salary as most salaries are set by a governing body, union or professional association. 75% of the respondents worked full time and 21% worked part time or less than 35 hour a week. The top rank salary for full time members who responded to the survey was \$28,000-30,000 (19%), followed by \$32,000-34,000 with (13%) \$26-28 and \$30-32 was next with (11%). Part-time Library Technicians averaged (26% respondents) \$10-12 and \$14-16/hr.

FROM STATISTICS CANADA

SURVEY OF EMPLOYMENT PAYROLLS AND HOURS

Historiacal Revision and NEW Products

The Survey of Employment, Payrolls and Hours (SEPH), introduced in 1983, is Canada's only source of detailed monthly earnings information. It overs firms of all sizes in over 280 industries to determine employment patterns, average earnings and average paid hours of work across Canada and in the provinces-territories.

SEPH was adjusted for all the methodological and coverage changes that occurred over its eight-year history. This revision ensures that SEPH data for employment, earnings and hours reflect a more accurate snapshot of economic change for this period. As well, the SEPH team has developed some new products for data users as a result of the revision.

data	users as a result of the revision.
	Seasonally-adjusted data-to provide more precise information on the magnitude of non-seasonal changes affecting employment, earnings and hours by industry.
	Fixed-weighted average earnings indexes-to adjust for changes in the composition of employment. This data will provide a better indicator of the underlying trends in wage rates.
	A diffusion index-to show the percentage of industries that depicted increases for a specific SEPH variable. It will be particularly useful in analysing the trends in cyclically-sensitive industries, such as manufacturing.
	More data for firms by size of employment- to help analysts and planners interested in measuring the economic performance of larger versus smaller firms by industry or province.

The new products will be available in several formats, including a re-designed publication (Cat.72-002), electronic outputs and customized tables. SEPH analysts are confident that this revision and the new products will go a long way to better serve data users.

The Lighter Side

Among house staff in hospitals and some staff in the medical library where I work, I have observed two variations of what seems to be yet another disease peculiar to our modern era.
