

TALTA MEMBERSHIP MEETING

NOVEMBER 15, 1994

On November 15, TALTA members participated in their first informal meeting of the new membership year. On site at Metro Toronto Reference Library, Joanna Wellheiser, Manager of Preservation Services, spoke to us about the preservation and conservation of library materials. We saw a series of slides taken at Metro Ref. of books in various states of deterioration, and some of the ways not to store or handle them, in an effort to ensure the longest life possible. Issues ranging from proper shelving, damage from food and drink (imagine a banana peel bookmark!!), to water damage and fire were covered.

After the slideshow and the question/answer session that followed, Ms Wellheiser took us on a tour of her very impressive preservation laboratory where books, maps, etc. of the Metro Ref were restored. We learned about tried and true methods and materials, mostly very simple, that we can use in our own libraries to extend the life of our collections. Ms Wellheiser gave us advice on an expert scale and we thank her for her time spent sharing her knowledge and expertise.

About 20 TALTA members were present to enjoy the meeting which included refreshments (as usual), and a social time for chat before and after the formal portion. In response to suggestions from our survey earlier this fall, name tags were supplies to members and executives to facilitate our efforts to get to know each other better. People who were strangers before could, and did, more easily strike up conversations. Thank you to all those who turned out. We hope to see you back, plus many of you who could not join us for this informative and entertaining meeting.

The 1994 TALTA Christmas Social featured the coowner of Toronto's Sleuth of Baker Street mystery bookstore, J.D. Singh, as our guest speaker. As TALTA members enjoyed a buffet dinner, Mr. Singh gave an eloquent presentation on the subject of mystery and detective fiction, and described in detail some its various sub-genres. For instance, we found out that a mystery/detective book can be classified as a "cozy" if it leaves the reader with a comfortable, safe feeling at the end. In a "cozy" mystery, there is no graphic description of the crime violence, and the villain is always neatly apprehended.

Mr. Singh recommended the book Encyclopedia Mysteriosa (New York: Prentice-Hall, approx \$39.00 Cdn) as a useful reference source for mystery book information. This one volume encyclopedia lists mystery book awards, definitions of mystery terms and subgenres, and information on popular mystery writers.

VOLUNTEER LIBRARY WORK

In these difficult times a lot of library technicians such as myself remain unemployed due to the competition for those salaries library positions which become available.

However, another source of library employment is the Volunteer Position, which is occasionally advertised. I have applied for several part-time positions, and on my acceptance I have discovered there have been few, if any, other applicants. It occurs to me that out-of-work library technicians are missing an opportunity here.

Of course, volunteer positions do not pay one's rent and grocery bills, and one might consider that they interfere with the job seeking process. However, my experience is that the pro's of taking such a position are greater than the con's which I have mentioned.

Working as a volunteer has made a great difference to my morale. Any of my readers who have been unemployed know how depressing it can be to be out of work. The few hours one may spend as a volunteer each week need have little effect on one's job search. Having a workplace to go to even for a few hours makes a lot of difference in one's state of mind. This can significiantly affect the impression one may make in a job interview. Furthermore, such work keeps library skills honed and gains experience. I have acquired much useful experience in library automation which can only be found on the job.

Also, even unpaid volunteer jobs can provide one with references and contactswhich can open doors in the workplace that might otherwise be closed. Finally, there is always the chance that your part-time volunteer work might change into a full-time paid one.
