

WHAT'S USEFUL ON THE INTERNET

On Tuesday September 26, twenty-seven TALTA members took part in this information meeting, getting a headful of ideas to take back to their workplace. Jennifer Reiswig, Manager of the Toronto East General Hospital's Health Sciences Library, escorted us knowledgeably through the intricacies of the Internet via slides and a computer demonstration. After a glimpse at generalities, Jennifer introduced the audience to the tools used in "surfing" the Internet, on a search for sites and information of interest to staff (and patrons) of libraries.

We learned of electronic discussion groups and newsletters such as LCCN: LC Cataloguing Newsline / LISTSERV@SUN7.LOC.GOV and SERLST: Serials in Libraries / LISTSERV@UVMVM.UVM.EDU. We also were informed about interesting Web sites for libraries, such as the National Library of Canada Home Page at http://www.nlc-bnc.ca/ehome.html and index sites such as The Whole Internet Catalogue at http://nearnet.gnn.com/gnn/wic/index.html. One of the newest additions, indicated on the generous handouts that we received, is InterCat: OCLC's new experimental database of bibliographic records for Internet resources at http://www.oclc.org/oclc/man/catproj/catcall.htm.

After the lecture and demonstration, refreshments were served in the Health Sciences Library and members had the welcome opportunity to chat with Jennifer and each other in a relaxed and friendly social time. Many thanks to Jennifer Reiswig for her time and efforts on TALTA's behalf. I am sure the members present took back to their jobs some valuable new knowledge. If you couldn't make to this fine meeting, hopefully you will be able to attend the next one in December. See you there.



FILM SUGGESTIONS FOR THE SEASON

'Tis the season to celebrate, and part of the tradition of the holiday is to bring the family together, sing carols, toast the occasion, gather for the big dinner, then relax around the nouveau fireplace, - i.e. the television - and stoke it with videotapes.

Now, I could suggest many films that are appropriate for the time, like A Christmas Carol, White Christmas, A Christmas Story, The Holly and the Ivy, and The Nutcracker, but everyone reviews these films at this time of year. What I am going to suggest are films that deal with libraries and library work. And no, they are not documentaries either. If shopping for films on this subject, I hope that this article will do you some service.

DESK SET 1957 *****

Here is by far the best of the films, starring Katherine Hepburn and Spencer Tracey. Basically, it is the retelling of the John Henry folk tale whereby a computer is put into the research department of a TV station, only to be challenged by Ms. Hepburn, whose memory is a match for the technical wonder. This film is a very witty and wise comedy and the stars are electric in their performances. Highly recommended!

THE HOUSE ON CARROLL STREET 1988 ***

This is an interesting film set in the early 1950s with Kelly McGillis as a blacklisted librarian who stumbles upon a botched spy plot involving far-right extremists. The film is more or less a routine adventure with a fast pace ending, but most interesting about this film deals with the communist witch hunt of the post-war period and explains that long before the blacklist hit Hollywood and made it big news, the first victims were librarians, specifically women.

PARTY GIRL 1995 *

Sorry, recommendations for this film come hard. This is the story of a girl from the dance club culture confronting maturity and a career. The amusing point of the film is that she gets a job in the New York Library system and finds her salvation through mastering the Dewey Decimal System! (I don't make up these things, I just review.) Caveat emptor!

JOHNNY MNEMONIC 1995 **

Keanu Reeves plays the part of a messenger who transports information in his brain, which is a head-size computer. I am recommending this film because library technicians are more likely to know the meaning of mnemonic before anyone else.

THE NET 1995 ***

What happens if your identity is erased at the flick of a switch by someone on the internet? Sandra Bullock stars as the unfortunate netsurfer trying to track down her demons. The film is a standard adventure set upon a questionable premise, but it has some good elements. The film gives a very basic idea about the internet to those who have not used it yet. It also is recommended as the hero, Bullock, is female and gets to do what males have been doing in films for years; resolve a problem on one's own terms. (NOTE: THE NET may not be available on tape this season as it is still playing some theatres after four months of release.)

THE PAGEMASTER 1994 ***

The Pagemaster is a half live action/half animated feature for children, specifically younger children. It is the story of a bratty little boy (Macaulay Culkin) who enters a library and learns about life through the Pagemaster, a librarian played by Christopher Lloyd. Lloyd introduces Culkin to books, which he opens and enters a new and exciting world. The weakness in the film is that Lloyd plays an eccentric, almost a cliche in films, where male library workers are social misfits and female workers are harsh matrons whose professional mantra is "SHHHHHH!!!" This aside, the film stresses the positive side of reading and has been endorsed by the ALA.

ONLY TWO CAN PLAY 1962 ****

Peter Sellars is a mild-mannered library worker (another cliche) who has a flirtation with Mai Zetterling. The film, from the satirical novel by Kingsley Amis, is a bit dated, but it is nice to see the library worker as something of a romantic figure, and Sellars provides great acting and lots of laughs.

National Library of Canada on World Wide Web

As of June, the National Library of Canada has been offering services on the World Wide Web. National Library information is now available via a hypertext, multimedia, distributed system that runs on the Internet. The Uniform Resource Locator (URL) of this new Web service is http://www.nlc-bnc.ca/

The National Library's Web service includes, for example, the Library's fall publications, descriptions of its collections and services, cultural events and exhibitions, and pointers to other Canadian Internet information resources. The Library's Web service will continue to be enhanced.

Library staff are developing a "Virtual Tour" of the Library. Adapted versions of other National Library Projects, such as Read Up On It 1994, the Canadian Literature Research Service reading lists, and the current exhibition on Canadian science fiction and fantasy, are being made accessible on the Web.

This new WWW service demonstrates the National Library's commitment to the Information Highway. "Our long-term objective is to provide electronic access to a much greater volume of Canadian material, both in Canada and around the world." explains National Librarian

Marianne Scott. "We are determined to make a significant contribution to the development of electronic access to information in Canada."

In March of this year, the National Library participated in a week-long demonstration of an "electronic library" project by working with the Library of Congress and two schools in Canada and the United States. The schools were able to access information on Canada's Confederation and the U.S. Civil War through Internet links to both libraries. Information made accessible through this project will also be available in National Library News and on the WWW shortly.
