PRESIDENT'S ANNUAL REPORT

March 26, 1996

The theme the executive followed this year was one of Quality, Communication, and Continuing Education. We worked hard to put our executive house in order, straightening out issues involving the archives, 10 year members awards, and mailings to new members.

In the area of communication, we worked to increase our understanding of the provincial executive, and to better communicate TALTA's concerns. We also sought to create a more vibrant connection between the TALTA executive and the TALTA members, putting special emphasis on the importance of the ... In touch with TALTA newsletter as a vehicle of informing members of issues and our planning process. We continued to summarize general TALTA meetings in the newsletter for members unable to attend, and we have added regular columns from our OALT/ABO Board of Directors Representative and the 1997 OALT/ABO Conference Chair. Our education program this year has emphasized technology and dealing with the change it brings. We have also added continuing education articles and information to the newsletter.

Finally, with a view to the future, the 1995/96 executive identified three areas needing change. First, the role and perhaps title of the Job Placement Liaison needs to be reworked to reflect the current job situation. The executive discussed this issue in some detail and suggests that the position shift towards career development. Another area we had identified was the newsletter cost, format, and publishing schedule. Finally, we identified a need to better liaise with Seneca College, perhaps to again set up a joint educational or job skills workshop that both Seneca students and TALTA members could attend, as has happened in the past. We hope our ideas and initial explorations of these issues will provide a foundation for change.

We appointed an excellent Conference Chair, Theresa Kennedy, to head the 1997 OALT/ABO Conference Committee. Theresa has the planning for the conference already underway, but will need the support and efforts of the TALTA membership so please consider what contribution you can make, and let Theresa know you are available to help. The biennial TALTA salary survey will be mailed in June with the results summarized in the next newsletter.

For my own part, I have learned many things by serving on the TALTA executive, and feel enriched by the experience. I have truly enjoyed working with the other members of the executive, and have appreciated the opportunity to speak to TALTA members and Seneca students during my term as President. I have learned to cherish our association, and I hope I can continue to contribute to its success.

The last two issues of ...In touch with TALTA have been photocopied, as opposed to being printed using the ink and printer method. The cost is considerably less using the photocopy method and only the most discerning eye can detect a difference in the letter quality from the two methods. However, the time of production was not appreciably faster due to the fact that the printer is in Mississauga, and TALTA operations are in Toronto. I discovered that one of the smaller photocopy services in Toronto, Printcom Graphics at 394 Bloor Street West, could do the full 150 copy run in about 20 to 30 minutes

TALTA MEMBERSHIP MEETING

Tuesday, January 23, 1996

"Technological Change and its Impact on Libraries"

We were treated at this meeting to a most thoughtprovoking presentation. John Jackson, Senior Technician at the Ontario Cancer Institute, delighted us with a history of technological change and its reception through the years, intrigued us with his account of recent changes that have affected us all and the possibilities yet to come, and challenged us to accept that change is an ongoing process that necessitates ongoing evaluation and follow-up. We as technicians should look positively on the opportunities technology can bring. In order to thrive as information providers and to grow as individuals we were urged to seize these opportunities, becoming part of the process of change, rather than being alienated by it and falling behind. Mr. Jackson gave all 38 of us in attendance much to contemplate, especially in regards to the electronic age of information that has grown so rapidly in recent years.

After his presentation, members engaged him in a lively question and answer session that presented more practical ideas for consideration. Thank you very much, John Jackson, for your time and your timely words to TALTA. We were very fortunate indeed for the opportunity to hear you. As usual, light refreshments were available and conversation between members rounded out the evening. Thanks also to Aileen Fisher, our Vice-President, for the idea and arrangements that produced this stimulating evening. The next meeting three weeks from now will be a follow-up to this evening's presentation.

Tuesday, February 13, 1996

"Coping with Change: A Panel Discussion"

About 20 TALTA members attended this panel discussion which was a follow-up to the previous meeting on "Technological Change and its impact on Libraries" featuring John Jackson of the Ontario Cancer Institute. The panel, representing a cross-section of library types, consisted of Douglas Willford of Humber College, Charmaine Sommerfeldt of the Ministry of Citizenship, Jane Sauder of Women's College Hospital, and Mary Lloyd of the Richmond Hill Public Library. Each discussed the changes their library is undergoing and the techniques and attitudes they have found effective in dealing with them. A very lively and interesting question and answer session followed the discussion and refreshments and one-on-one conversations rounded out an excellent evening.

Douglas Willford told us about the 20% budget cut and job losses in his library, and of similar cuts occurring in the rest of the College. He made it clear that all of us

must expect change in our workplaces and to change along with it by looking for opportunities to increase the library's role in the organization, by maintaining the library's vitality, e.g. by providing up-to-date technology, workshops, increased customer service, implementing user fees, soliciting support from Friends of the Library, sharing resources within the organization, joining planning committees, and ensuring that library staff continually update their skills.

Charmaine Sommerfeldt has recently undergone change in her own job due to her lay-off and redeployment to a totally different department which is still being downsized. She has had to put her library research and reference skills to use answering telephone inquiries about various social services available to the public, information that is available to her online. In the past, she was laid off from a position in the private sector and had to find new employment. Her advice for anyone facing such a drastic change in their lives is to be proactive about it: have a revised resume ready, network amongst colleagues informing them of your situation, look for other applications for your skills, and be willing to redirect your career, taking up any new challenges with a positive attitude.

Jane Sauder's hospital library has only half the staff it formerly enjoyed, but she feels that the new technologies allow for smaller staffs. However, it is necessary for small library staffs to possess a variety of skills and to stay on top of the technology, via continuing education courses, in order to provide even better customer service. In her experience, the Internet is as yet too unorganized to be an efficient tool for her library to rely on. The Toronto Health Library Consortium is the best tool for finding and sharing information, resources, and technological innovation in health libraries. She also advises prioritizing work, working as a team, and initiating fees for service. Last but not least, maintain a sense of humour for laughter is a great stress reliever.

Mary Lloyd has worked at her library for 17 years, during which time many changes have taken place, including a move to a new building. After the move, the size of the collection doubled, and the circulation and reference statistics quadrupled - all with very little increase in staff. To cope with budget cuts, branch hours were shortened and surplus staff was moved to the central branch to serve the increased numbers of patrons there. A hiring freeze is presently in effect due to the recent provincial budget cuts to public libraries, cuts that especially affect the checking in and reshelving of material. Fortunately, Richmond Hill is a growing, progressive community whose council values its library and has been very supportive to date. A new automated system and CD-ROM databases were approved before the cuts and have not been postponed or cancelled. Recently, the library's management was restructured in anticipation of future changes in its service to the community.
